# WHITWORTH MEDICAL CENTRE

As we move through another lockdown, be assured Whitworth Medical Centre remains open. For clinical needs, reception can arrange for doctors or nurses to telephone initially and invite you for a face-to-face appointment if necessary. Please do not attend the surgery unless you have been invited.

We are sorry waiting times have built up, partly because each face-to-face encounter takes us longer due to spacing, cleaning and changing PPE, we are busy with the surge in Covid cases, providing clinical cover for the Rossendale Covid vaccination programme and dealing with the usual winter pressures. Additionally, we have staff shielding and working from home, some have to isolate due to illness or contact with Covid cases. Please consider if simple queries could be dealt with by NHS 111, online or asking your pharmacist for advice.

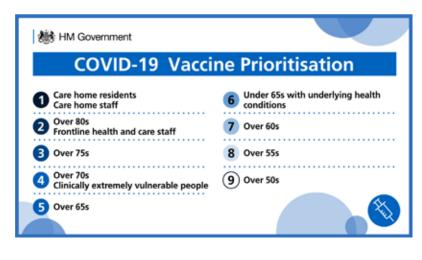
Certain routine work has stopped temporarily, this includes chronic disease monitoring for people whose condition is stable, so we can concentrate on people with poorly controlled chronic conditions such as Asthma, Diabetes or COPD who are vulnerable to developing complications of COVID-19. Other essential work such as cervical smears, cancer treatment and children's immunisations will continue.

The 'stay at home all the time' message for shielding patients is not repeated in this lockdown. Clinically extremely vulnerable (shielding) patients should not go to work and stay at home as much as possible but can exercise following distancing advice. If they cannot work from home they may be furloughed or claim statutory sick pay. Fit notes are not required for shielding (unless unwell and too sick to work). Letters to work are not required by GP surgeries. Clinically extremely vulnerable patients will be sent new letters – emails/texts will also be sent where contact details are available centrally. Only those who get a new shielding letter should shield.

### **COVID VACCINATION PROGRAMME**

The UK vaccination programme has started. An independent group of experts recommended the NHS first offers vaccines to those at highest risk of catching, suffering serious complications or dying from COVID-19.

The programme is coordinated nationally and GP practices are helping with clinics at Rossendale Primary Health Care Centre (the Hub) in Rawtenstall. The storage requirements and shelf life of the vaccine mean it is not practical for individual practices to run clinics. You do not need to book an appointment; the NHS will contact you when it is your turn.



We have progressed substantially through Group 1 and made very good progress vaccinating those in group 2. For housebound patients over 80, we require supplies of the more portable (Oxford) vaccination. This is being prioritised to older Group 1 nursing home residents initially. We encourage over 80 year olds to attend the local clinic if possible to reduce delays and preserve nursing manpower for those in need.

There is more information available on shielding and vaccinations on the Government website.

Beware- these unusual times have created opportunity for scammers to take advantage of vulnerable people. The Covid-19 vaccination is free of charge via the NHS. There is NO way a private vaccination can be legally bought in this country. The NHS will never require your bank details, PIN number or payment for delivering the Vaccination.

We thank you for following the ongoing national guidance, maintaining distancing and wearing face coverings when it is necessary to attend the surgery or for vaccinations. We appreciate your patience during these extraordinarily busy times.

Volunteers must drive and have access to a vehicle. This role requires a DBS enhanced check which will be done free of charge. Being a Home Library Service volunteer is much more than just collecting and delivering books, it is about spending a little time with each person. A friendly face and a chat can make a real difference, helping people to feel cared for and valued by their community in a socially distanced, Covid-safe way.

### **KEEP WHITWORTH MOVING**

Despite a challenging year, Lancashire County Council's highway maintenance service managed to fix 92% of potholes on time. A wet, stormy winter caused more potholes than usual in 2020. This extra pressure was combined with lockdown, when staff were diverted onto other urgent work. The team have been busy catching up and are now well on track to meet their target of fixing most potholes within a response time of 22 working days.



The county council is responsible for 4,600 miles of highway, it's a massive task to maintain. They focus on priority routes and repairing more serious potholes. They have invested in new technologies including jetpatching and the multi hogs to fix potholes more efficiently and improve your roads.

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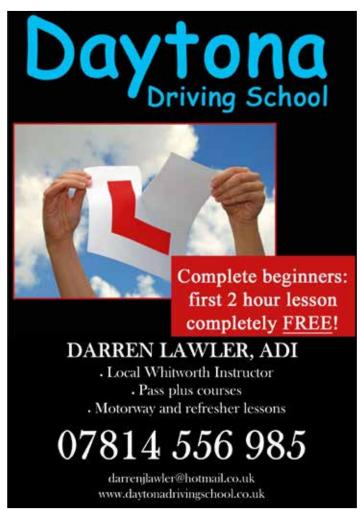
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### A HUNDRED YEARS AGO

2020 proved to be a difficult time for everyone in the Valley. If asked what was going on in Whitworth in 2020 the answer would be, "Not a lot!!". Volunteers at Whitworth Historical Society delved into the museum archive for information on life in Whitworth a hundred years ago.

In 1920, 452 births (including 3 sets of twins and 1 set of triplets!) were registered and 66 marriages took place at local churches. 1918 saw 631 registered deaths for Whitworth compared to 466 deaths in 1920. A likely indicator of the impact Spanish Flu pandemic had in the area.

St Michael's School, Shawforth, log book for 1918 records, "Owing to the influenza epidemic, the school closed on 26th June 1918, by the order of Dr Forbes, Whitworth Medical Health Officer, allowing for the premises to be fully disinfected." The school reopened on 8th July 1918 but on 25th November 1918 the log stated, "1 teacher and 50 pupils were absent owing to influenza and whooping cough being very prevalent". The school was closed yet again on 2nd December 1918, until 6th January 1919.

Further education, especially night school courses, took place at Whitworth Technical School in 1920. The school, at Spring Place, Facit, just to the rear of what is now Law's Butchers shop, offered courses in technical studies, coal mining theory & techniques, dressmaking, music and millinery.

Hallfold Chapel organised a "Welcome Home" concert party on 7th February 1920, for sailors and soldiers returning from war service. Now in 2021, concerts, parties, education classes and examinations seem to belong to a different world!

Hallfold Church on Hall Street is, like most others, currently closed. However, when usual activities recommence, the church will run a weekly, gentle exercise to music class on Tuesday evenings. Bear this in mind when you are trying to shed those extra lockdown pounds! The sessions cost only £3 and begin at 7pm.

### WHITWORTH RESIDENTS NAMED IN NEW YEAR'S HONOURS LIST

Despite facing adversity, two Whitworth residents have gone above and beyond the call of duty to improve their communities and services.

Richard James Sercombe, Member of the Order of the British Empire (MBE) is a Data Technologist for Brakes who lives in Whitworth. He was awarded his MBE for services to Vulnerable People during the Covid-19 Response. Brakes usually supply wholesale foods to schools and the leisure industry. When the first lockdown was announced, Richard and his team came up with the IT infrastructure to help the government to deliver food parcels to 1.8m residents nationally who were clinically extremely vulnerable. In his spare time, Richard volunteers to Whitworth Valley Football Club and coaches two under 10's teams.



Arnold Wilson Ashworth, Medallist of the Order of the British Empire (BEM) was acknowledged for a lifetime of volunteering and charitable fundraising in the community of Whitworth. Arnold has always been an active member of the Whitworth Community as chairman of Whitworth Ameatur and Musical Dramatics Society for 28 years, then the president and currently a life member. He was captain of Lobden Golf Club in 1966, president in 1974 and 1975, now also a life member. He also became involved in Whitworth Cancer Research along with his late wife, Joyce. Together they supported fundraising for over 50 years since 1964! Arnold wishes to acknowledge everyone who has supported Cancer Research Whitworth Committee and Whitworth Amateurs over the years and made this achievement possible.



### CANCER RESEARCH WHITWORTH LOCAL COMMITTEE

The committee would like to thank supporters for continued support and generosity and express pride and delight that the longest serving member, Arnold Ashworth, was awarded the British Empire Medal in the Queen's New Year's Honours list. Arnold has served the committee for over 50 years and, along with his late wife Joyce, is the reason the group is probably still here. He has been a stalwart and inspiration - congratulations Arnold, well deserved.

There are no activities planned as yet for this year with the virus continuing. Hopefully by the next edition there might be some hope on the horizon for events to be planned. Although the group have been restricted in their fundraising they have still been able to raise £7000 in 2020 and thanks go to all who have made donations and held sponsored events. ### **READY, STEADY, CENSUS**

Households across Whitworth will soon be asked to take part in the nationwide survey of housing and the population. It has been carried out every decade since 1801, with the exception of 1941. Information from the digital-first census will help decide how services are planned and funded in your local area. This could mean things like doctors' surgeries, housing or new bus routes.

Households will receive a letter with a unique access code in the post, allowing them to complete their questionnaire online. Paper questionnaires will be available on request. Census day is March 21. For more information, visit census.gov.uk.

The vegan cakes always go fast so call in early to avoid disappointment! Eggs are available from free-ranging hens kept on the farm on the side of Brown Wardle. Most hens are rescued from industrial scale farms by the British Hen Welfare Trust.

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### **POLICE REPORT**

### **TOWN TWINNING**

For 52 years Whitworth has been twinned with a town in Germany called Kandel. Many Whitworth families formed lasting friendships with people in Kandel.

Our friends in Kandel have also been managing the global pandemic. The Armistice ceremony in Kandel took place virtually this year. The Mayor Michael Niedermeier and 1st deputy Michael Gaudier laid down wreaths at the memorial for the First World War at the Plätzel in Kandel, including a wreath for Whitworth soldiers in the hope that never again will Britain and Europe go to War.



Kandel has restrictions in place residents must wear a mask outside home and only leave the house to go shopping, seek medical attention or to work. They have emergency staffing for kindergartens and schools and those who can should keep their children at home. Most school lessons take place digitally - but this does not work well because the schools were not sufficiently prepared for this. Some students have been given a laptop because not everyone can work at home.

Kandel have a large vaccination station in the district of Wörth and a similar system of priority groups. The Kandel council now hold meetings virtually by video and rarely meet in person.

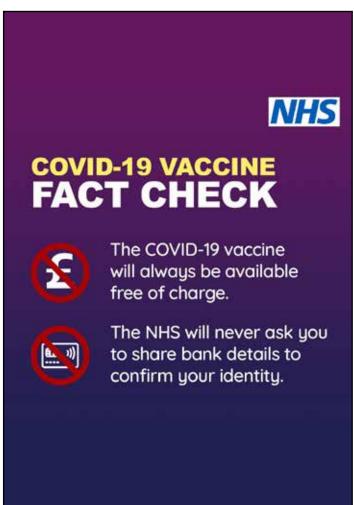

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### THE FUTURE OF OUR MOORLAND, BY BETH HOLT, AGED 20

I write this first hand as the daughter of a hill farmer in the Rossendale Valley. My family have farmed the same moorland for generations. it is now facing hugely unprecedented times and is under threat of no longer being home to grazing livestock at all. The biggest issue our uplands face is that it is treated as a playground for grown men with their motocross, enduro bikes and 4x4's. This has grown in popularity over the last 10 years and the increase. The mess and devastation they are leaving is beyond belief. It is illegal to use moorland for these purposes. Landowners and graziers are plagued with this activity 365 days a year.



Our moorland is home to many species of wildlife, several farmers flocks of sheep, herds of cattle; all of which are threatened with these devastating effects. There are scenarios where ewes have become trapped in motorbike ruts, bogged up to their necks in a peaty soup. Only if they are lucky, they are stumbled across to be rescued from their black wet grave before it is too late. Lambs, only hours old, are separated from the mothers - orphaned. Only the lucky lambs who are heard crying for their mothers are found by their shepherd or a kind rambler. The unlucky ones look death in the eye as the cold causes hypothermia and their body shuts down.

There are many examples of injuries caused to sheep by bikers. In one case a ewe was hit by an

off-road bike. She was heavily pregnant at the time and her pelvis was completely shattered. The ewe went into early labor and only when she delivered did they realise the sheer speed and force with which she had been hit. Her newborn lamb had two broken legs caused by the impact with the biker who did not even have the respect to stop. Both mother and lamb had to be put down to end their suffering.



Other farmers have their cattle 'rounded up' in a game by the bikers. This 'game' led to a calf, only days old suffering a broken leg.

Contrary to popular belief these hills are not 'wasteland' which no-one owns and no-one cares for. They are home to some of the most environmentally friendly lamb and beef for generations, reared on land which cannot support any other kind of agriculture or serve any productive purpose. These environments are the UK's largest store of carbon, the UK peatlands store the equivalent to 8 years worth of total UK carbon emissions. The ruts these bikes make speed the flow of water from the hills to the valley bottom causing erosion and flooding.

It is only now that I feel that the future for hill farming is very bleak. The land we have been custodians of for generations is being torn apart, the peat can no longer do its job properly.

### **FANCY A WALK?**

Currently it looks doubtful that the Skyline walk will go ahead in May, but judging by the number of people out and about whenever there's a hint of blue sky, there's obviously an appetite for walking in the valley at the moment.

Whitworth Sports Council have been granted some money by the Connecting East Lancs Access Fund to produce a new series of leaflets, detailing walks in Whitworth. These are short, easy walks – none much longer than going round Cowm, circular strolls starting and finishing from various easy-to-find places within the valley. There are 12 of them, and they come as a pack, called Strolling Whitworth, and they are free of charge. You can get them from Josh Law's Butchers, the Post Office and the Co-op. walking Whitworth 1-8 and walking Whitworth 9-16 are still available (1-8 is running low). These walks are a bit longer, all designed to fit into a half-day session.

### **BLUEBELL HILL**

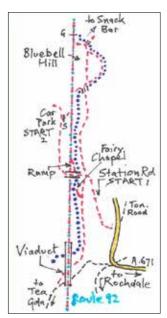
**Option 1** Park on the left side of Station Road, Broadley before the bridge - go through the kissing gate on the right of the bridge, down to the main path through Healey Dell. At the path, go straight on.

**Option 2** Drive over bridge at Station Road, Broadley, car park on left 150 metres ahead. Opposite the car park is a squeeze-stile, leading to a set of shallow steps. Go down, then turn left onto the main Healey Dell path.

This path is shared greenway so be aware of bikes and other users. Once it was a railway line, built to serve the needs of the quarries at Facit. To begin with that's where the line terminated, at sidings just beyond Whitworth's other Station Road, at the Halfway House. Later the line was extended to Bacup, with the station at Britannia, at 1000ft above sea level, being the highest on the whole Lancs and Yorks network.

We're not going that far today (fine walk though it is!) — we're settling for Bluebell Hill, which is the first lump on your right, about a ¼ mile ahead. Just past the little hill, turn right off the main path, next to the river. Notice the slim bridge — a bit too narrow for a really satisfying game of Pooh-sticks...there's a better one later. Most people will keep turning right, on this path that may be a bit muddy, but if you wish you can follow the line of the river for longer if you follow an even narrower path just ahead around to the left. It'll re-join the obvious path near the Pooh-sticks bridge.

After your game, cross the bridge and walk the length of the duckpond to a junction. Here, going right takes you back to the main path, where you go left, retracing your steps to your car. Going left, up a path that's rough, and always shady, will take those who took parking option 1 directly back to their chariot. If you took option 2, when you reach the bridge turn right, across it, and along the roadway to the car park.

**Refreshments** Healey Dell Tea Rooms are down in the Dell – further than you've just done, and uphill after eating. To drive there, go right at the top of Station Road, then right at Healey Corner down narrow, bendy Dell Road, which is very pitted beyond the cottages. Corner shop at top of Station Road Snack bar - turn left at top of Station Road and drive a ¼ mile

**Possible walk extensions** - The snack bar is 300m. up above the narrow bridge, Healey Dell viaduct is 300m south of Station Rd ramp and the Fairy Chapel is very close and signposted down steps from Station Road (but the tricky steps down from that path need real care).
