

PARISH LENGTHSPERSON VACANCY

An unusual vacancy has arisen in Whitworth for a Parish Lengthsperson. The purpose of the role is to keep the "length" of Whitworth neat and tidy. The hours are 7.5 hours per week on average but the actual hours can be mutually agreed with the Town Clerk and can be flexible to fit the needs of the person and the position. The post is paid at living wage and training will be provided as necessary to help the role be completed. The ideal candidate will live in the local area and have suitable transport.



This is a varied post which includes, but is not limited to, maintaining Town Council property, fixing fencing and stiles, carrying out emergency repairs, cleaning noticeboards, watering and maintaining flower beds, grass cutting and strimming of vegetation, litter control, leaf clearance and cleaning out of blocked gullies, conservation projects and schemes within the community, liase with the local community, farmers, landowners and official organisations to enable works to be carried out effectively and with the necessary consent.

PARISH COUNCIL VACANCY

The retirement of Jim Mellor has left a vacancy on the Town Council. If you are interested in serving as a Parish Councillor representing the Facit and Shawforth ward, please write to the Town Clerk, include your CV and a brief explanation of why you are interested in joining the Town Council. The Council meets twice a month except during August. If you would like to know more about the role,

please contact the Clerk. The closing date for written submissions of interest is Wednesday 1st September 2021.

Candidates will be invited to speak at the Town Council meeting to be held on Thursday 9th September after which a vote by Councillors will take place. Full details of the process can be found in the co-option procedure available on our website home page.

Qualifications to be a Councillor

A person is qualified to be elected and to be a Councillor if they are a British, Commonwealth, Irish or European Union citizen and on the relevant day (that is, the day of nomination or election) they are 18 or over.

In addition, the person must meet at least one of the following criteria

- on the relevant day and thereafter they continue to be on the electoral register for the parish, or
- (2) during the whole of the twelve months before that day they have owned or tenanted land or premises in the parish, or
- (3) during the whole of the twelve months before that day their principal or only place of work has been in the parish, or
- (4) during the whole of the twelve months before that day they have resided in the parish or within three miles of it.

Except for qualification (1), these qualifications then continue for the full term of office, until the next ordinary elections.

Certain people are disqualified from standing, and these include paid officers (including the Clerks) of the council, bankrupts and those subject to recent sentences of imprisonment.

CHECK YOUR TREES FOR ASH DIEBACK DISEASE

Lancashire County Council is urging anyone with an ash tree on their property to check its health this summer to ensure it does not become a danger to themselves or others. Ash Dieback is a highly destructive disease caused by a fungus which has spread throughout the UK in recent years. It can lead to infected trees shedding branches or limbs, or potentially collapsing as the tree dies.

The county council estimates that around 127,000 ash trees next to roads throughout Lancashire will need to be regularly checked to ensure they do not pose a threat to safety. There is no cure for the disease and it is fatal in the vast majority of cases.

The county council will be contacting tree owners over the coming months if their tree is a danger to the highway, but if you have an ash tree which could be a hazard to people or property, you should get it checked out by a qualified arborist. Now that trees are in leaf is the best time to look for signs of the disease in your ash tree/s. It's important to use a properly trained and insured person to carry out work as infected trees can be particularly dangerous.

Many of the documents are unique to the Whitworth collection. ANGLO RECYCLING FOCUS ON REDUCING SINGLE USE PLASTIC



When the guys on plant 1 at Anglo Recycling used to empty the enormous dust bags (recycling textiles creates a lot of dust) they used to put the dust into plastic bags- a dozen enormous bags a week- which we had to throw away after use. A colleague, Martin Street, had the simple idea to put the dust into a large reusable skip. Fantastic- it saves 12 plastic bags a week and pays for itself by making emptying the dust bags a lot easier and a quicker process. Rob Ellis who runs that line on the evening shift said that "it's brilliant"!

Simon Macaulay, Chairman, commented "It was one thing to put in a recycling line to reduce carpet to landfill by 25-30 tonnes a week as we found applications for the carpet fibre the line generated for us. But I am even prouder that we are creating an environment where colleagues are all the time looking at ways to use less disposable materials"

WHITWORTH VALE AND HEALEY BAND

Whitworth Vale and Healey band recently announced the passing of Euphonium player Bryan Warrington. Bryan has played with many bands across the country from Rochdale to Whitburn in Scotland.

He has been a great servant to the Whitworth Band over the years and his work with the Youth Band has been incredible. This has paid off by inspiring numerous players in their banding development, many of whom have gone on to play with top section bands and to have careers in music. He leaves a large hole in the banding world that will be hard to fill and his presence in our band will be greatly missed. We hope that his legacy of working with young players will live on for many years.



Whitworth Band started rehearsing again in May, and would like to extend their thanks to Angela Rhodes of Healey Care for the kind offer of premises at Holt Mill so we can remain covid secure.



Whitworth is surrounded by stunning moorland, home to an array of wildlife including birds which are on the Red List (endangered) and also livestock, grazing cattle and sheep farmed in traditional ways. This helps to keep the landscape accessible for walkers, riders and legitimate moor users.



These uplands contain peat bogs, huge carbon sinks whose importance has never been greater. They are the lungs of our towns and cities and must be preserved for future generations.

Commoners are people who occupy land or property to which rights of common, predominantly grazing rights, are attached.

The West Pennine Commoners Association works hard alongside other groups to protect the moorland AKA common land from illegal activities which have damaging effects on the environment and the livelihood of hill farmers. The moorland is governed by statutory laws which are as legally binding as any other law. The three basic laws are:


- 1. No fires
- 2. No vehicles may be driven on the moor (except for farmers with rights, tending stock)
- 3. No camping

WHITWORTH GOES WILD

Work on the new Whitworth play space has now started. It's a little later than planned, but the team are on site and work is due to finish mid-October. The plan, funded through Rossendale Borough Council and Viridor Credits, involves creating a new play space with a strong natural play element. Materials used are not the usual equipment sourced for play areas- instead the focus is on natural materials such as rope, wood, boulders and sensory planting schemes. The design doesn't include any wet pour or rubber surfacing to minimise any environmental impacts and keep the public space as natural as possible. To ensure that nature and wildlife remain protected, the Council are also working with Lancashire Wildlife Trust ecologists who are conducting biodiversity, wildlife, bat and tree surveys to ensure that nothing in the design has negative effects on the surroundings. In fact the plans will actually enhance the wildlife and natural space, as works will include planting, tackling areas of overgrowth, path improvements, signage and the removal of damaging patches of Japanese Knotweed and Himalayan Balsam.

Sarah registered the Farm in March 2021 with Social farms and Gardens & Thrive, setting about her business plan to open in Autumn 2021.

Within 3 weeks Sarah had taken enquiries & bookings to attend from as far away as Salford local authority. Bookings have already exceeded 50% capacity and Sarah's first 12-month business Plan.

"It's more than cuddling cows", Sarah says, "there are horticultural aspects, conservation and preservation, working alongside Country Rangers and other wildlife monitoring projects. Embarking on educational environmental schemes underpinned by DEFRA and Natural England. Hedge laying and dry-stone walling. Or just fresh and freedom in our beautiful valley."


