WHITWORTH RUSHCART PROCESSION

Whitworth Rushcart will take place on Sunday 1st September. The procession leaves Whitworth Museum (North Street) at 1pm featuring traditional morris dance troupes and will travel up the main road, led by the Rushcart itself towards The Ashcroft. From 1.15pm until 4.30pm, the car park of The Ashcroft will be cordoned off for stalls, entertainments, and performances from various morris dancing troupes and members of the Whitworth Vale and Healey Band. The Ashcroft bar will be open for liquid refreshments and there will be a variety of food available. There will also be an arts and crafts fair in The Ashcroft main hall.

The Whitworth Rushcart is one of only four such celebrations which still take place in the United Kingdom. Whitworth's cart is unique in that it is the only one to be covered in beautiful heather that is in bloom at this time of year, collected by the Whitworth Rushcart Men from the moors above Darwen before the event. Rushcarts in other areas are covered in rushes or tatters of cloth. For the procession to go ahead smoothly, we need the help of 22 volunteer marshals to assist the road traffic management company by directing traffic away from side streets. You don't miss a thing; in fact, you get to watch the procession from pride of place. WHITWORTH COMMEMORATES D-DAY 80TH ANNIVERSARY

Whitworth Town Council were proud to participate in the national D-Day commemorations in June. At 9am on 6th June 2024, Cllr Gareth Baron, Mayor of Whitworth, proudly raised the Flag of Peace, in commemoration of the 80th anniversary of D-Day. At 9.15pm that same day, a commemorative beacon was lit at the top of Brown Wardle, alongside other beacons across France and the United Kingdom as part of the International Tribute to recognise the bravery and sacrifice of all those involved in the D-Day landings. Everyone at Whitworth Town Council would like to thank all the volunteers who took part in helping our town mark this incredible anniversary.

On Sunday 9th June, our Tourism and Leisure Committee hosted an extremely popular 80th anniversary commemorative afternoon tea which also featured entertainment from Whitworth's own national champions, Whitworth Vale and Healey brass Band, as well as Whitworth Community Choir and u3a's ever popular ukelele band. The volunteers on the day worked incredibly hard to provide almost 200 afternoon teas (and teas and coffees!) and ensure all those attending had an unforgettable time. Whitworth Museum also kindly provided WWII memorabilia and a volunteer charitably brought his 1940s Bedford QL truck for attendees to have a look at.

Finally, thanks to everyone who came and joined in with the commemorations. The TLC were so pleased with the response that plans are already underway for an 80th anniversary of VE Day in May 2025!













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HEDGEHOG AWARENESS WEEK

The UK once boasted 30 million hedgehogs but sadly, there has been a momentous decline to 1 million. Loss of habitat, inhospitable and impenetrable gardens, highways, pesticides and herbicides have all played a significant part in their dramatic reduction.

But all is not lost. Whitworth Town Council have purchased a number of hedgehog highways which include information leaflets and two Town Councillors, Cllr Sarah Rhodes and Cllr Kim Olaolu, were then invited into three local primary schools to talk about the much-loved prickly mammals. The children enjoyed learning all about hedgehogs and more importantly, they learned how they can help to secure a future for them, including how to create an organic garden that's safe and that allows hedgehogs to roam and forage for food.

The children also entered a poster competition, and 10 winners were selected from each primary school. Cllrs Kim and Sarah were absolutely blown away by the children's enthusiasm and creativity, producing fun packed, illustrative and informative posters. They said it was incredibly difficult to choose just ten posters per school, because they were all brilliant. After much deliberation, they made their final selections. Each winner received a hedgehog highway, which allows hedgehogs access to a garden, along with a certificate. Please look out for these fantastic, informative posters around the town.


THE ORIGINS OF WHITWORTH MEMORIAL GARDENS

This article is based on research done by Anita Farrow of the Whitworth and Healey Horticultural Society who says she spent many a happy hour at Facit Park playing hide and seek in the rhododendrons, and on the children's playground (now the scout hut).

In January 1919, a public meeting was held at Lloyd Street School to discuss the provision of a War Memorial in Whitworth. The decision to locate it in its present position was taken when the owner of the land, Major W A C Lloyd, donated the area, and work began on the boundary wall in June 1920.

By June 1921, the stone obelisk was erected and the bronze tablets bearing the names of the fallen soldiers followed later.

On 13 August 1921, Major Lloyd was presented with a 'golden key' with which he unlocked the gates and formally declared the park open. As he unveiled the memorial, three volleys were fired and the Last Post played. The brass band played and once the proceedings were over, the residents of Whitworth continued with sports on the cricket ground, dancing at the Conservative Club and a band concert on the Recreation Ground.











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FROM THE COLLECTION - DONKEY STONES

Up to about 70 years ago, a common practice in northern mill towns was to 'donkey stone' the front door step of one's home. A donkey stone is a solid block about the size of a bar of soap and made from a mixture of ground sandstone, cement, bleach powder and water. It is a hard, abrasive cleaner.

Originally used on greasy steps in textile mills, the stone was dipped in hot water and vigorously rubbed on the steps to give a non-slip coating making the steps much safer on which to walk. Outside the factories, housewives used the donkey stones for cleaning flagstones adjacent to their houses and also the front door steps. It was a matter of pride to have a well 'stoned' step. Stones were available to buy from most local shops but many obtained theirs from the rag-and-bone man in exchange for old clothes. Several companies manufactured these stones including Pony Brand and Lion Brand but the brand name of Donkey Stone is now used as the product's generic term. Whitworth Museum has several donkey stones in its collection.

WHITWORTH'S REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY 10th NOVEMBER 10.20am

On Sunday 10th November, Whitworth residents will gather to remember those lost and injured during times of conflict. The town's Remembrance Sunday commemorations will begin with the procession which sets off from the former Town Council Offices (near the corner of Market Street and Tong Lane) at 10.20am. The procession route will be subject to a road closure for this short period of time and drivers are advised to avoid the area.



The procession will arrive at Whitworth Memorial Gardens in Facit at approximately 10.40am and will be followed by a service of Remembrance around the Cenotaph, including a two-minute silence at 11am. Following the Service of Remembrance, everyone is invited to join the Mayor for light, warm refreshments at The Ashcroft. This event can only continue with the help of volunteer marshals to assist with the road closure.



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

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As Whitworth reaches the point of reopening the Leisure Centre fully, perhaps we should take stock of precisely what's been done, and how we've got to this point.

It was brilliant news back in the spring when it was announced that Whitworth Leisure Centre CIC had been successful in attracting a substantial grant from the government. Put simply, that made reopening a possibility.

However, the money we bid for, and got, was less than a fifth of what Rossendale Borough Council's building report claimed was necessary, so we had to be realistic about what we could achieve. The report was useful in identifying all the building's faults, but we had to pare that back, focusing on immediate priorities, and essential, rather than desirable, costs.

We also had to save costs wherever we could, and that was where Whitworth's sheer generosity and determination came to the fore. Volunteers cleared and painted; local tradespeople did jobs for free or at cost; there were donations of money; and various fundraising schemes. And, from when the first bit of the Centre – the gym – was reopened (which was before we were awarded the grant, a real leap of faith) the place has been staffed by volunteers who have kept things tidy and ticking over.

The gym is not all bells and whistles, but those who have been using it seem to have appreciated it hugely. But the cash it has brought in has been a trickle, to be blunt. It's obvious that many people have really been waiting for the pool to reopen. That job was always much bigger, and has required more complex planning, more skilled workers, and much more money (though some heroic local tradespeople have again done some jobs at cost, or donated time). There also had to be quotes gathered, selected and justified. A further complication arrived with the announcement of the general election – all government money is frozen until after an election, so that any new government can scrutinise the outgoings they inherit. But work has been done. The asbestos in the changing room ceilings has been professionally removed. (Other areas, professionally assessed, have been sealed.) New ceilings, hiding new electrics and pipework, have been installed. The big windows in the pool, damaged when RBC boarded them up, have been completely replaced. The learner pool – destined to become an exercise room/gym extension to try to raise more revenue – has been separated from the main pool. The pool has been partially regrouted, scrubbed and filled, to enable the plant room equipment to be tested, and has then been chlorinated to ensure a good quality of water to swim in. (Exactly the same process as when CLAW reopened the pool before.) New alarm systems have been installed, and new fire doors are on the way. Outside, guttering and fascia boards are in the process of being replaced. Some smaller windows have had to be replaced.

But much outside has not been done yet. There is roof work to be done. And obviously the John Street side is still a bit of a mess, and the river side is still an overgrown wilderness/dumping area. We have plans for both those areas, but there is only so much you can do at once. Watch out for a new opportunity to volunteer!

In July we've begun the task of hiring paid staff – in preparation for the pool reopening in August. The Valley News copy deadline prevents us from giving details of that reopening here – but have no doubt it will be shouted from the rooftops – we can't quite shout yet, in mid-July.

We're trying to get school swimming and private lessons up and running as soon as possible, and we will be delighted to welcome Whitworth Swinmming Club home too. Public swimming hours will be widely advertised, and of course the Leisure Centre has its own noticeboard now, so details of Pilates classes and yoga groups and the evening running club and other news will be on there too.

Obviously we hope that as many people as possible, from Whitworth and beyond, will come and use both the pool and the gym. It's NOT a shiny new Leisure Centre, but it's HERE. It's OURS, because Whitworth decided it was important enough to fight for. It's ours, and WE have to make it work. That means two things. Firstly, it's use it or lose it – every single customer is helping to keep it open. If not enough people use the Leisure Centre it will dwindle, and shut – and that will be that.

It is also a fact that it is going to need volunteers to keep it open – it will probably never generate enough cash to have a fully-paid workforce. So, when volunteering opportunities are advertised, please think positively about any contribution YOU could make. This is a genuine community asset that some Whitworth volunteers, backed by the Town Council, have revived. It will need fresh injections of volunteering blood to keep it healthy, and make it a place we can all be proud of.

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
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


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CANCER RESEARCH UK WHITWORTH LOCAL COMMITTEE

There is only one event to report on since the last magazine and that is the Golf tournament at Lobden in June. The event was a huge success raising £1,100. Many thanks to Lobden Golf Club, all who participated, all the helpers on the day and those who donated prizes. The late summer golf tournament will take place on Sunday 8th September. The group have been given their next targeted piece of equipment to raise money for. Its name is quite a mouthful - Amersham Western Blot Imaging System. The cost is £22,200 so it's quite a challenge for us this year. This machine enables scientists to look at the interaction between pancreatic cancer cells and the body's scaffolding system. This is significant at the present time as there is a large increase in pancreatic cancer in young people, especially young women. This equipment will be invaluable in looking at ways to treat this disease.

SKYLINE AND FELL RACES

Skyline 9 took place a little later than planned this year, due to the weather forecast for the original date suggesting the likelihood of thunderstorms (they arrived a little late, but powerfully).

Lobden Golf Club (thank you) were able to offer a date 3 weeks later... a day of perfect walking weather, which was lucky. 480 walked, somewhat fewer than last year, but not bad at all in the circumstances. After expenses, and a donation to the Rossendale and Pendle Mountain Rescue team, and boosted by the generosity of many entrants, the event raised £1849, which Whitworth Sports Council has donated in its entirety to the Leisure Centre. Skyline 10 is set for May 18, 2025.

It's been a year of postponements. **Whitworth's Junior Fell Race** also had to shift from its original date due to horrible weather on the original date. Again the Golf Club and some flexible marshals rode to the rescue. 88 7-16 year olds ran (another impressive turn out) with the race won by 15-year-old Thomas McKee. First girl home was 13-year-old Megan Earnshaw. Our Lady and St Anselm won the inter-school trophy.

The day before, in glorious sunshine (but it was nippy) the **Brown Wardle and a Bit Moor** senior fell race set off from Edward Street to crest Brown Wardle from the west, divert onto and over Middle Hill, then return by traversing Brown Wardle from the (even steeper) east. The winners were Dave Parton (in 29.29) and Kay Welsby (in 32.47) – both Rochdale Harriers.
