
How it works? People enrol freely, attend as a learner, receive education and graduate. Education happens in a beautiful setting within a supportive, diverse group whose own journeys contribute to the learning experience.

Who's it for? Courses are open access and most have no prior learning needs. Any course cohort tends to consist of three groups – people who are there for their own needs, those who attend for the needs of their loved ones or family members and those who come as part of their own continuing professional development or as an interested party.



Courses are delivered by ELRC's own team of Mental Health experts in partnership with Lancashire Adult Learning.

A POLITE REMINDER - EXERCISING DOGS IN WHITWORTH CEMETERY

Whitworth Cemetery opened for burials in 1879 and is set amongst open countryside, with the commanding Brown Wardle Hill at the very top and well managed farm land to the left. Many people who come to attend family graves often remark at how beautiful it is. The setting obscures the fact that you are only a short distance from the main



road. All you can hear is the chirping of birds and rustling of the leaves in the trees. Wildlife thrives in and around our cemetery and often deer, badgers, foxes and squirrels have been sighted, to the delight of those who capture a glimpse of them. To the amusement of many, it became apparent that deer are very fond of roses and quickly devour them. This just adds to the appeal and character of our unique little cemetery.

Many people walk their dogs here, cemeteries are public places, however, some may not be aware that cemeteries have protection orders. This means there are rules that members of the public must adhere to and not doing could result in fixed penalties or prosecution. The rules are that dogs have to be kept on leads and under control at all times and it is an offence to allow dogs to foul the cemetery. Dog mess must be picked up and disposed of in the bins provided. With this in mind, we hope everyone who visits, will feel their loved ones are laid to rest in a beautiful, peaceful setting.

WHITWORTH MUSEUM

Last year, Whitworth Museum was gifted with models of Whitworth Railway Station and Healey Viaduct. When received they were in poor condition, they have been successfully restored by two gifted volunteers and are now on permanent display. In early January the models took pride of place when Year 4 children from St. Anselm's School visited to



discover more about the history of transport in Whitworth. They found it hard to believe the old train line ran directly behind their school along Cowm Park Way. The children were fascinated to see photographs from the museum's archive of early trains, trams, cars and charabancs, vehicles that were once commonplace in the valley. They were also intrigued with an automaton of George Stephenson's Rocket that has recently been donated to the collection. This is the next project for the conservation team to tackle. It was lovely to see the children so engaged and focused, despite Covid, the museum staff aim to keep visiting local schools.

Whitworth Museum is open, free of charge, every Saturday from 11am to 4pm. Hope to see you soon, even if it's just for a cup of tea

ANGLO RECYCLING UNDERLAYS- REDUCING OUR ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT

Anglo's big recycling project for 2021, to reduce changeover times on our recycling line so that we can process a wider variety of waste streams economically. This means we can manufacture the fibre in house for an underlay for a major DIY retailer in the UK.

But when we do this kind of work these days' we don't just put the old equipment in the metal skip. We try to reuse as a company where possible. We are all looking to improve our environmental impact.

In this project, Mike Keiley, our electrician, reused the old electric panels in our new set up.

He switched the wiring from contactors to inverters. He explained that an inverter is like a dimmer on a light bulb- instead of running at full tilt all the time, the motor only takes the energy it needs. He reckons energy usage is reduced by 35-45% and it gives a payback of 12-18 months.





SKYLINE 7

Whitworth Sports Council are planning **Skyline 7** for Sunday May 15. The event will go ahead only if organisers are convinced it can be done covid-safely, and without so many restrictions to stop it being a joyful community experience.



For those who don't know, Skyline is a 14-mile circular walk on the tops above Whitworth, this year in a clockwise direction. Walkers can enter in advance (with a discount) or on the day, registration at Lobden Golf Club between 7.45 and 9.15, finishing there, with a certificate and a bite to eat in the afternoon. Sensible clothing/footwear is a must.

It's a challenging walk, but there are two simpler options — a 9-mile **Western Skyline**, starting at Lobden and ending at Britannia; and a 3-mile **Skyline Sunday Stroll** which ends before the ascent of Rooley Moor Road.

Entry forms and an information sheet will be available from The Ashcroft, the Leisure Centre and other establishments from early in April. There will be no online entry facility this year: it proved too time-consuming in 2019.

If the event has to be called off, there will be announcements on Facebook and on the Town Council and Sports Council websites and notices will be posted around Whitworth.



As reported in the last edition of Whitworth Valley News, the volunteer group was given a Silver Gilt Award by the judges from RHS Britain in Bloom who visited the town for a two-hour 'pleasurable tour' in July '21. They remarked that 'this proactive group' had created 'horticultural entertainment and a town to be proud of'. They were impressed, not just by the 'floral impact' the group has made but also their enthusiasm and commitment.

The group has been active during winter (although not quite at the same pace as the other seasons!) with tidy-ups around town but the real work will start soon. SPODDEN VALLEY PARK UPDATE

The patience of the people of Whitworth has certainly been tested with the intended improvements at Spodden Valley. Some of the work has progressed well with part-improvement to paths, removing and eradicating non-native species such as Laurels, Japanese Knotweed and Himalayan Balsam (this will continue into 2022). However, contractors have run into several difficulties in implementing the natural play spaces and finishing the paths. As many of you can appreciate, following



Brexit and combined with the pandemic the contractors have tried to deal with staff, material shortages and transport issues. The contractors have had to delay completion and came off site whilst these issues could be resolved. The contractors are due to return to site the 2nd week of February when they are confident all the materials and equipment are in place to implement on the ground. We are also involving two local primary schools in the finishing touches to the scheme. Local school children will help plant native trees and wildflowers by the end of March 2022 with full completion of the project by Spring 2022 – just in time for some lovely weather ...fingers crossed! Thanks for your continued patience and understanding everybody.

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE PARISH

Brian Furness, Chairman said: "The implementation of this project will provide an additional dimension to what is currently a series of static exhibits. Some form of dynamic element, which this project seeks to introduce, is always of particular interest when trying to connect with children, although it is increasingly the case that adults are also similarly influenced. Without this funding such a project would not have been possible for a small organisation such as ours."

Other projects being supported this year are Whitworth Sports Council, Ebor Studios, Rochdale Children's Moorland Home, Wardle Football Club, The Women of Whitworth Project, CROWS, Pennine in Bloom and Upper Calder Renaissance. A full list of groups supported can be found on the website.



The funding is provided by Crook Hill Wind Farm which is managed by Vantage Infrastructure, supported by Partnerships for Renewables and administered by GrantScape. The Fund distributes £35,000 annually over the 20-25 year lifetime of the project. Groups located within a 5km radius of the wind farm can apply for grants between £250 and £10,000.





WHITWORTH TOWN COUNCIL PRECEPT 2022/2023

Whitworth Town Council has this year set a net budget of £58,329.91. The Council has worked hard to keep the increase in precept to a minimum, which has been difficult in the current financial climate and in the face of further cuts to the Council Tax Support Grant from the Borough Council.

This past year has seen some pressures on finances and significant increases in costs, but some decent savings have been made in various areas of the budget to off-set this and the Town Council's wise investments are providing a healthy dividend. The Council is facing tough times in the next few years as we are expecting further cuts from the borough, so we strive to increase income and reduce spending wherever possible. Expenditure includes salaries for the Town Clerk (30 hours), our full-time Whitworth Town Caretaker, who makes a significant impact on the town's cleanliness, and our Parish Lengthsman, who tackles repairs and general maintenance around the town and also opening of the toilets at weekends.

The Town Council utilises social media and their website to encourage a two-way dialogue with the community. The Valley News magazine, produced quarterly, continues to be hugely popular, and the Council's Tourism and Leisure Committee has a variety of leisure and cultural events planned for the year ahead. The Town Council continues to promote Whitworth as a great place to live, and lobbies hard for the best possible services for the town. It is at the forefront of tackling crime through the sponsorship of the Police Community Support Vehicle and facilitates monthly multi-agency meetings attended by all the local agencies. To conclude, the Town Council continues to be proud of its achievements and looks forward to working with and for the people of Whitworth during the forthcoming financial year.

GREATER MANCHESTER CLEAN AIR ZONE IMMINENT

You might have heard about the Greater Manchester Clean Air Zone and are wondering if you are affected and what it means for you.

The first phase of the Clean Air Zone is due to launch on 30th May 2022, affecting buses, HGVs, taxis and private hire vehicles licensed outside Greater Manchester, and coaches which don't meet emission standards, with some exemptions. Most vehicles in Greater Manchester are not affected and private cars, mopeds or motorbikes are not included. This will have an impact on many local businesses and it is important to be aware of the changes.



In a statement, Greater Manchester Mayor Andy Burnham and Councillor Andrew Western; the city-region's Clean Air lead said:

"In March 2020, the Government instructed all ten Greater Manchester councils to introduce a charging Clean Air Zone to tackle harmful levels of air pollution and achieve compliance with legal standards by 2024 at the latest.
