



#### SHEEP WORRYING - WHITWORTH TOWN COUNCIL



Sadly, this is a message we must reiterate every year. We are in the season of lambing, calving and foaling and sadly the issue of sheep worrying is as prevalent as ever.

The CRoW Act 2000 states that ALL DOG WALKERS must keep their dogs on a short lead of 2 meters between the 1st of March and 31st of July and at ALL TIMES in the vicinity of livestock throughout the year. To protect livestock and ground nesting birds, lapwing, curlew, merlin and snipe. Graziers have the RIGHT in LAW to close the high ground entirely.

Every year there are an alarming number of very sad and preventable incidents involving ewes and lambs, caused by dogs off their leads, worrying the sheep. Sheep worrying causes immense distress to these defenceless animals and they are often left in a dreadful, bloody state which results in the humane destruction of the pregnant ewes. Besides the egregious act of sheep worrying, graziers are having to deal with the separation of ewes from their lambs, caused by dogs off their lead and running wildly on the moors in the vicinity of them. This is incredibly distressing and damaging to both animals. Let us not forget that this impacts our commoners' and farmers' livelihoods too. The common land is managed land and their place of work.

There has never been so much disturbance of livestock, maiming and killing of animals, and it is all preventable, by simply ensuring that dog ownership is always responsible where livestock are grazing and complying fully with the CRoW Act 2000.

Please, always be a responsible dog owner and keep your dog on a lead at ALL times around livestock.

#### **BUDDY UP WITH A BLOOMER**

By the time you read this, the Whitty Bloomers will have chalked up a good number of hours preparing the various beds, boxes and baskets they manage around the town. The areas they share, and work in cooperatively, include Healey Corner, the library, the bed in front of the surgery, the Coop beds, the area near The Bug, Cowm Park Way North, The Ashcroft, the Fudge Factory, the cemetery, the Memorial Gardens and Britannia.

They get a lot of satisfaction from seeing the fruits (and flowers!) of their labour, especially when it is appreciated by so many members of the public. However, another huge bonus is the mental and physical health benefits that are well documented from gardening. So, if you fancy benefiting yourself and your local community but maybe don't feel you have the confidence to know what to do or know where your help would be most useful, please consider the option of buddying up with one of the existing volunteers.

#### WHITWORTH SPORTS COUNCIL

Whitworth's two summer Fell Races will take place as usual in June, maintaining a skeletal SPORTING presence while hoping for a revival (next year?) of Whitworth Sports Festival – anybody want to take it on?

Our long-established Junior Fell Race will be on Thursday June 13 at 7pm, with the start at Lobden, the traditional route around the back of and then over Brown Wardle, finishing just above the start at Lobden Golf Club, where the presentations will take place afterwards. Entrants must be aged 7-16 and will need to sign up in advance, £2 per runner, with trophies to all Age-group winners, a timed certificate for all - your entry gets you a drink and a chocolate bar when you finish. Paper entry forms will be available at schools and at the Leisure Centre, and there will be an online entry too.

The day before, on Wednesday June 12, the Brown Wardle and a bit Moor race, for Seniors (16+), will start from Edward Street at 7.30. The race is usually dominated by club runners (from all across Lancashire and West Yorkshire) but is open to local runners too. Be warned, however – it's a properly accredited fell race, up and over Brown Wardle, then left onto Middle Hill, and back the same way (-ish): not much more than 3 miles but steep and demanding, not for the unfit or the faint-hearted. Registration is at the Scout Hut on Longacres Lane, next to the Memorial Garden.

#### WHITWORTH MUSEUM

Cycling both on and off-road appears to be gaining in popularity these days but competitive cycling on the track was taking place in Whitworth more than 120 years ago.

Several of the districts in the Rossendale Valley had their own cycle clubs but in the Township we had the 'Whitworth Wheelers Cycle Club', whose 'home' base was the cycle track at the Rawstron Street playing field, a venue now used by the Whitworth Valley football team.



The attached picture is of four members of the Rossendale Bicycle & Tricycle Club, at the start point of a one-mile race around the cinder track. The event took place on the 3rd July 1898 with the winner recorded as H.I. Whitworth. Mr Whitworth can be seen second from the right wearing a cap and with a moustache!!

This, and the many other photographs in our collection, can be seen at Whitworth Museum, North Street, which is open each Saturday between 11.00am and 4.00pm or at other times by appointment. While donations are welcome, entry to the museum is free of charge.





#### **HISTORY**

Whitworth Town Council was formed in 1974 following the reorganisation of local government in England. Prior to this date, Whitworth Urban District Council was the administrative body in the Valley, but was abolished following the reorganisation.

The history of local government in Whitworth began 100 years before this, in 1874, and so local government in Whitworth is actually celebrating an incredible 150 years this year! The latter end of the 1800s saw a great deal of local development. As a result, a Local Board was set up in 1874 to administer Whitworth. Further independence arrived towards the end of the century with the creation of the Parish of Whitworth, one of 19 new parishes carved out of the original vast Rochdale Parish. Complete independence came in June 1894, when an urban district council replaced the Local Board. The first meeting was held on 3 January 1895 and the first chairman (appropriately enough) was a Mr William Ernest Whitworth. Whitworth had thus, at last, become ecclesiastically and administratively free of its neighbour. The wheel turned full circle in 1974 when the Urban District Council was abolished, and Whitworth was absorbed into the newly created Rossendale Borough Council (RBC).

The last Chair of the Urban District Council, Vincent Clegg, became the first Mayor of Whitworth for about 6 weeks, until the first elected Mayor of Whitworth Town Council was nominated in May 1974 – Dr John Tierney.

#### **MAYORS OF WHITWORTH**

Each May a new Mayor of Whitworth is elected by council. The Mayor is the first person of the town and has the honour of representing Whitworth on numerous engagements throughout their mayoral year. Regardless of gender, the elected person is called the Mayor and they may be accompanied by a Mayoress or Consort, whichever they choose. The Mayor also chairs the Town Council meetings and, in the event of a tied vote, has the discretion to cast an additional vote on a particular motion.

An interesting fact is that the Mayor can wear the mayoral chains wherever they choose within the township, but permission has to be granted to wear them in other parts of Rossendale or even across the border into Rochdale - in fact in any area that is not Whitworth! The reverse is also true; any other Mayors coming into Whitworth need to ask permission to wear their mayoral chains here.

#### WHITWORTH TOWN COUNCIL

Whitworth Town Council acts a pressure group for its residents and its councillors all have their own passions and interests. Each councillor brings into the role their own lived experiences and relevant expertise, with the aim of assisting residents in whatever their issue might be. The Town Council have a range of subcommittees, including the Tourism and Leisure Committee. The TLC (as it is affectionately known) consists of both councillors and a lovely group of volunteers. These committed, enthusiastic individuals help to organise events such as the annual Rushcart celebrations, the joyous Santa Express, Christmas Trees on Brackets which help to illuminate the township, and the world-famous Duck Race.



#### WHITWORTH TOWN COUNCILLORS

The Town Council consists of twelve councillors. Contact details for each member can be found on the back page of this publication. Councillors are elected on a four-yearly basis and each councillor will be elected onto different committees and outside bodies, ensuring that the Town Council is represented in organisations such as Whitworth Playgroup, Whitworth Sports Council, Crook Hill Community Benefit Fund and the Whitworth Community Partnership meetings organised by RBC.

We thought the celebration of 50 years of WTC was a great opportunity to reintroduce to you our committed and hard-working councillors. We will be featuring a number of councillors in this and future editions of the Whitworth Valley News. In this edition, it was thought to be apt to firstly reflect on a current councillor whose connection with the council encompasses a phenomenal 50 years too!



#### Councillor Tom Aldred

Tom joined Whitworth Town Council in September 1974 as its Responsible Finance Officer. Throughout his time as an employee, he also took on the role of Town Clerk, merging the two roles, a situation which continues to this day.

After leaving his job, Tom then became a councillor and has remained on the Town Council right through to present day and is the first point of contact for all historical matters. He became an Honorary Townsman in 2012, in recognition of his outstanding contribution to Whitworth, an honour only bestowed on 10 esteemed individuals to date



#### **Councillor Louise Burton**

Louise is our newest councillor. She joined WTC in July 2023 and has lived in Whitworth for the past 30 years. She works at Hopwood Hall College in Student and College Services and has previously been chairperson of Whitworth Playgroup Committee. Whist chair, the Playgroup received an outstanding recommendation from Ofsted and Louise considered this was partly due to the amazing, dedicated staff employed there.

She was diagnosed with Multiple Sclerosis in 2000 and felt that despite the ups and downs of her illness, she was keen to take on a new challenge of becoming a councillor to help to keep the town as wonderful as its residents are.

#### **ELLIE "THE EAGLE" SOARS HIGH**



In February, Ellie Clegg, a year 4 pupil at Tonacliffe Primary School, attended the British Schools Alpine Open Skiing Championships 2024 in Pila, Italy.

Competing against athletes from other UK schools and British Schools in France and Italy, she came away – in her very first Alpine race experience – with an impressive two bronze medals in the under-10 age group in both the Slalom and Giant Slalom events. Ellie, who has been skiing for only two years, is a member of Ski Rossendale Race Club, and trains weekly at The Hill (Ski Rossendale) in Rawtenstall.

She will now be turning her attention to the UK summer race league, competing in the GB Indoor and Outdoor series, which is the highest level of ski racing in the UK.

Ellie said, "It was great to represent my school and my village, and amazing to win two medals – but the best thing was making lots of new friends."

# PLEASE HELP TO PROTECT OUR VULNERABLE BIRDS AND SMALL MAMMALS

Did you know that the Lancashire and Yorkshire Wildlife Trust and the Dogs Trust encourage owners to keep their dogs on leads during the nesting season – April 1 to August 30?

Whitworth Town Council (WTC) are asking our community to consider keeping dogs on leads when visiting our local nature reserve, Healey Dell, and Cowm Reservoir. Please note that WTC owns Waingap Woods/the Trim Trail, and here dogs must be kept on leads at all times, not just nesting season. For your own safety, and to protect nesting birds we implore you to keep to the footpath which forms the perimeter of Waingap Woods.

We all enjoy walking in nature. However, it's a busy and crucial time for our wildlife too, especially at ground level. Skylarks, lapwings, meadow pipits, woodcock, robins, dunnocks and nightjars all nest close to or on the ground. Springtime also brings migratory visitors that have travelled thousands of miles to nest across our countryside.

These ground-nesting birds are incredibly vulnerable to disturbance from dogs, causing them to abandon nests, thus losing their eggs or chicks. Two thirds of ground-nesters, including curlew, are in decline. Many are critically endangered. Disturbance by dogs can make it even harder for them to survive. Nesting and fledgling birds are particularly vulnerable – the eggs of a willow warbler are so tiny that they can be crushed in a moment without a dog-owner even noticing.

Many dog-owners are of course passionate about nature and want to avoid harm. But even the most well-behaved dogs can unintentionally cause distress or damage wildlife, simply by following their natural curiosity. Birds perceive free-roaming dogs as predators, and may abandon nests, leaving eggs and chicks cold and unprotected – leading to their demise.

Responsible dog owners can help wildlife if they:

- Keep dogs on short leads, particularly in nature reserves, where wildlife should have priority.
- Clean up after their dogs, disposing of waste in bins or back home. Dog waste can carry
  diseases dangerous for wildlife, and by increasing nutrients in soils above healthy levels
  it causes harm to fragile habitats.
- Prevent dogs from jumping in pools insecticides in dog flea treatments pollute waterways and kill wildlife too.

#### **CUSTODIANS OF HEALEY DELL**



We are blessed to have a nature reserve here in Whitworth and many of us enjoy walking through the trees listening to bird song as we go.

What should be a wonderful, peaceful experience is blighted by litter and fly tipped items from Massey Croft bridge all the way down to the first gate, polluting land and the river Roch. The dangers to birds and small mammals is high as they become entrapped in the litter that's been so carelessly strewn on the ground and water courses. Most of the litter and waste has been discarded in truly inaccessible places and requires special equipment and manpower to retrieve, costing valuable time and money affecting every local taxpayer. Millions of animals are either badly injured or killed, including domesticated pets, every year on litter. Toxins from this waste leech into the ground and river forever changing the equilibrium of nature.

Whitworth Town Council, together with Rossendale Borough Council (RBC), are working closely to monitor and prevent future fly tipping and littering of our nature reserve. An extensive cleanup operation was recently conducted and surveillance of Healey Dell will be ongoing.

If anyone witnesses fly-tipping, please make a note of the vehicle's registration number and a description of the person. RBC WILL carry out an investigation and enforce action against the offenders.

The Environment Protection Act 1990 states it is an offence to drop or leave litter on any land. A fixed penalty notice may be served by RBC payable within 14 days of the notice being issued.

The natural world is on the brink as habitats and species buckle under human pressures; therefore let's work together to protect our natural world for the sake of us all and become good custodians of our nature reserve, Healey Dell.

#### WHITWORTH MEN'S SHED

#### WHITWORTH TOWN COUNCIL ANNUAL REPORT 2023-2024

#### MAYOR'S OVERVIEW Cllr Mike Royds - Mayor of Whitworth 2023 - 2024

I have had a fantastic year as your Mayor, although it did start with a bang, hearing about the closure of the Leisure Centre just four days into my term of office. During this time, I was also involved with the legal issues regarding the cattle grid but with the outstanding help from our small team of councillors and our hard working Town Clerk, both these important items had successful outcomes. We had a great day celebrating the Rushcart with many people attending and kind weather. A very moving duty for me personally was leading the tributes at the Remembrance Service, once again very well attended and immaculately observed.

I have been very busy representing you and Whitworth. I have met some lovely people, attending almost some 35-40 events. Some very moving ones include giving out GCSE awards for some very talented pupils at Whitworth High School, organising and presenting the Whitworth Business & Community Awards, attending some very entertaining Nativity performances and meeting with other Mayors from around the area such as Hebden Royd, Blackburn, Rochdale and of course Rossendale.

I would like to thank everyone who has supported me by attending or giving raffle prizes and donations for my fundraising events this year – Spring party, quiz night, curry night etc. We have certainly been busy and should have managed to raise a good amount, to give out to our local charities and community groups. I couldn't have done it without the support of my wife & Mayoress and our local councillors so would like to thank them all for what they have done this year. I can honestly say I have learned a lot this year and enjoyed representing you – the great people of Whitworth. I will continue to support you all I can as a Town Councillor.

#### **INITIATIVES**

The Council is supported by Town Clerk Rachel Hodson, who works 30 hours a week as standard. The Council employs a Parish Lengthsman, Chris Rothwell, for general repairs and maintenance, including attending to Public Rights of Way, mending footpaths, fences and stiles and undertaking a multitude of jobs in and around the town. The Council also employs a full-time Town Caretaker position which is funded in part by Rossendale Borough Council. Glen lliff, our Town Caretaker, litter-picks targeted sites the length and breadth of the town, and reports issues and problems to the Clerk. All three maintain healthy attendance sheets – a testament to their professionalism and commitment to the town.

The Town Council's website, www.whitworth.gov. uk, is well used and an asset to the Council. The site aims to be a one-stop-shop for Whitworth information for residents and visitors and is updated by the Town Clerk.

Whitworth in Bloom continue to put on a blooming fantastic display. This year they brightened up the bicycle at Britannia and the lower tier of the fountain planter at Healey Corner with regal colours, as a tribute to King Charles' Coronation. They also continue their tremendous efforts at the Memorial Gardens and Whitworth Cemetery,

two places which Whitworth residents can take time to reflect on what a beautiful town we live in. They also spend a lot of time maintaining the areas at Cowm Park Way North, where their Beasties BnB continues to thrive.

The Town Council-produced quarterly Whitworth Valley News magazine continues to be a very popular read, receiving editorial contributions from a wide variety of organisations and featuring 41 paying advertisers. It involves a significant amount of work for the Clerk but is very well received and ensures all in Whitworth are up to date with town news and developments. It is hand-delivered to all households by the Sports Council volunteers.

The Town Council contributes towards the fight against crime with the continued sponsorship of the Whitworth community police car, which has proved invaluable to the local constabulary. This has been made possible by generous sponsorship towards the cost provided by RRG Toyota Rochdale.

The Town Council works in partnership with Rossendale and Lancashire Councils and other local organisations including Lancashire Police and Together Housing to provide the best possible services for the Whitworth community.

To give examples, the Town Council facilitates monthly Multi-Agency meetings, where representatives of all the main agencies come together to tackle issues in the town. The Town Council continues to take a pro-active approach to tackling the issue of litter and uncollected dogmess, supporting the legislative work undertaken by the Borough Council, issuing further letters to residents around particular 'grot-spot' areas and supporting volunteers by providing litter picking equipment.

The Town Council's Tourism and Leisure Committee, featuring councillor and non-councillor members, organises or part-organises many events annually – this past year's offers

include the Rushcart, a wreath making workshop, First Aid courses, Santa Express and the New Year's Duck Race. Additionally, the Town Council itself is responsible for organising Whitworth's Remembrance Sunday commemorations and the Community Carol Service. All these events serve to preserve and strengthen the town's identity and provide a solid sense of community and civic pride.

Comprising town councillors and representatives of local sporting organisations, the Whitworth Sports Council continues to flourish, and plans for the 2024 annual Skyline walk are well under way.

#### TOWN TWINNING

Whitworth has been twinned with Kandel for over 57 years and the friendship between the towns continues. Cllr Aldred and the rest of the committee are instrumental in keeping the twinning alive, and thanks are due to them for their continued work; if you wish to get involved

with Town Twinning in Whitworth, please contact them. A delegation from Whitworth will visit Kandel in October this year and Whitworth Town Council hope that all the delegation enjoy their visit there.

#### **PLANNING**

As a statutory planning consultee, the Town Council passes comment on all Whitworth applications; Rossendale Borough Council then takes these observations into account when reaching planning decisions. Since April 2023, 31 applications have been considered by the Town

Council, ranging from new bungalows to fencing around Festival Park Bowling Green. The Town Council is also consulted on Highways proposals and other consultations which relate to or affect the Whitworth area.

#### CONCLUSION

Whitworth Town Council continues to work to the best of its ability to serve its community. The quality of the council is monitored and ratified through the benchmark council awards scheme, and the feedback from the community is overwhelmingly positive.

The Town Council strives to be as accessible as possible, with the magazine and website facilitating communications to the community, and the availability of the town clerk and councillors, along with the publicly attended council meetings, enabling a two-way communication with residents, organisations and businesses.

The Town Council works with local organisations and authorities to improve its offer and to enhance the lives of everyone in Whitworth, and to ensure that any issues or problems are monitored and dealt with swiftly.

This year Whitworth Town Council worked hard to facilitate the transfer of Whitworth Leisure Centre from Rossendale Borough Council and continues to support the newly formed Whitworth Leisure Centre CIC in its reopening of the facility. It is always looking for innovative ideas to tackle problems, and initiatives such as the support of the Whitworth police car and the partnership working with Rossendale Council on controlling dog mess are making a real and positive difference to daily lives.

On a lighter note, the Town Council continues to provide and support a range of fun, family events and initiatives throughout the year, encouraging community spirit and togetherness.

There will, as always, be challenges and opportunities presented over the year ahead, but the Town Council is well equipped to deal with both.

#### **JAKE BERRY**

Whitworth MP, Jake Berry, has welcomed £216,000 of funding from Government to support the re-opening of Whitworth Leisure Centre, and has congratulated Whitworth Leisure Centre CIC on their hard work in securing it.

After the shock closure of the Leisure Centre by Rossendale Council last Summer, CIC volunteers have worked hard to ensure the gym could reopen earlier this year – but the Leisure Centre desperately needed more funding to ensure the pool could reopen too. That day moved a step closer with the CIC's successful bid from the Government's Community Ownership Fund.

Commenting, Whitworth MP Jake Berry said: "I am so pleased that it looks like Whitworth Leisure Centre will now be able to reopen in full thanks to £216,000 of support from the Government. I had been lobbying ministers hard down in London to make sure they backed Whitworth, and I'm thrilled that it worked.

# THE ILLEGAL USE OF OFF-ROAD VEHICLES IN THE ROSSENDALE VALLEY AND SURROUNDING AREAS

The illegal use of motor bikes, quads, 4 x 4s and ATVs, on the moor and common land, contrary to popular belief, is not a victimless crime.

The livelihood of local farmers is under serious threat. Their working environment, the moorland has been damaged beyond repair, causing financial hardship and distress.



Other issues which are not exhaustive, include:

- Damage to the moor and irreparable erosion of upland peat.
- Wildlife, including ground nesting birds, whose habitat is being destroyed.
- Damage to fencing, dry stone walls, ripping out gates, cutting locks.
- · Harassment of cattle, horse riders, mountain bikers, walkers and wildlife.
- · Polluting water ways which flow into our reservoirs.
- Criminal, threatening and intimidating behaviour when approached.
- Serious incidents, when 999 calls have had to be made.
- Significant threat posed by irresponsible riding/driving on public highways, bridleways and footpaths. In most cases the vehicles are not registered or insured.
- They are in breach of S59 of the road traffic act and a Public Space Protection Order (PSPO), which Rossendale Council have in place. They ignore S59 and PSPO signage.

The perpetrators are organised groups, as large as 37 vehicles. These individuals travel a considerable distance (Mansfield, Yorkshire, Merseyside, Sheffield and Nottingham) specifically to come to Rossendale to illegally ride their vehicles, off-loading from vans.

There are local facilities which these individuals could use, Cown Leisure, BUT they would rather go down the illegal route.

#### Report incidents by:

- Calling 101 to GMP or Lancashire Police.
- Report retrospectively, on-line. If bikes are seen off-loading, obtain vans' registrations and images, as long as this doesn't put you at risk.
- If incidents are not reported, the Police are not aware.
