WHITWORTH TOWN COUNCIL - DOG FOULING

We are having an increasing number of complaints about dog fouling in our town. Not only is this unpleasant to see everywhere it does present with public health issues too. There are signs all around our town reminding people to please pick up after their dogs. Toxocariasis is an infection transmitted from animals to humans caused by the parasitic roundworms commonly found in the intestines of dogs and cats. Toxocara eggs are shed in infected animals faeces and pose a real danger especially to children who often rub their eyes and put fingers into their mouths. Toxocariasis can lead to blindness.

There are many responsible dog owners in Whitworth who also find this behaviour reprehensible. Dogs are habitual, therefore there is a high possibility that you witnessing the same dog fouling the same place daily. If any members of the public witness someone's dog fouling and their owners do not pick up after them, please report them to Rossendale Borough Council.

If this is outside your home or areas that are frequented by the public, you can call RBC and ask them to come and clean it up.

Report to fine, report to clean up, one way or another we can work together to stamp out this abhorrent act and irresponsible dog ownership in our town.

Please report on R.B.C. website and fill in the online form. All reports are treated in the strictest of confidence. Providing location, time and person, if known, is helpful. Fixed penalty notices will be issued to anyone found guilty of allowing their dog to foul a public place. https://www.rossendale.gov.uk/forms/form/10322/en/report_dog_fouling or search for dog fouling on the Rossendale Borough Council website. WHITWORTH MUSEUM

Following extended closure, Whitworth Museum is again open to the public. However, during the closure staff continued to handle the many enquiries regularly received not only from local residents but also from many corners of the world.

One recent enquiry, from Australia, concerned a family once resident in Whitworth well before 1750. Investigations suggest that over 100 members of the extended family are buried at the former Hallfold graveyard in Hall Street. One particular branch of the family lived at the hamlet of Cowclough and in 1841 lost three children, all under 4 years old, within just one week. Unfortunately, we do not know the cause.

Closer to home, one correspondent asked the former whereabouts of the Warpers Arms. This pub, then known as a beer house, was at the junction of Market Street and North Street and almost certainly took its name from its proximity to the former textile processor Matthew Stuttard & Son, who amongst other things, were warp sizers servicing the local weaving trade. Although no longer recognisable as such, the former pub building can still be seen and was, until relatively recently, a Chinese takeaway.

Whitworth Museum is open each Saturday 11am - 4pm.

A SAFE PORT IN A STORM

WHITWORTH'S GARDEN GANG!



The Whitworth Library Children's Gardening Group (aka The Garden Gang) has been meeting for the past year on Saturday mornings from 10:30-11:30. They started their horticultural activities by growing sunflowers and since then have developed into year-round gardeners, planting summer bedding plants and spring bulbs in the garden and boxes outside the library. They have also grown herbs and propagated succulents, learning about the different growing environments. This has been facilitated by a generous grant from Whitworth Community Partnership which has helped provide

a greenhouse, tools, seeds and compost. Now the group is branching out into vegetable growing and learning about self-sufficiency using different methods of planting.

In bad weather, the Garden Gang enjoy nature based crafts such as making suncatchers and decorating pots. With so much interest and enthusiasm from the staff and children alike, there's a definite feeling that future successful gardeners are being nurtured.

WHY WON'T "EWE" STAY PUT?

In light of the current exposure on social media regarding livestock roaming the valley, West Pennine Commoners Association feel the need to address some of the comments which have been made.

A general comment seems to be, "It's never been as bad as this in all the time I've lived here.". Perhaps the following observation will help.

Many years ago, the moor was well fenced. It was the accepted custom that landowners fenced against the moor and the only way onto the main road was through moor gates which were ALWAYS kept shut. Landowners fenced against the moor with a six-foot-high wall or a stock proof fence to keep animals on the moorland.

When housing development began in the valley, farmland became housing estates, and nobody maintained the walls and fences. Some walls were lowered so residents could enjoy the views; thus they were no longer stock proof. Cattle grids replaced gates and the Highways Department don't keep on top of their repair. People bought farms who weren't farmers and refused to shut the gates allowing stock to stray - one resident refused on the grounds that they would "get their shoes dirty!"

Yes, farmers are responsible for their livestock and the maintenance of their own fences. They are not however deemed negligent if stock strays from the moor aka common land as it is the legal responsibility of the landowner whose land adjoins the moor to maintain a stock proof barrier. It is ILLEGAL to erect a new boundary on the moor.

Farmers also deal with the ever-increasing numbers of the public on the moorland. Some of them treat the moorland as a giant playground and forget that this is the farmers' place of work, the place where they produce your food.

Off-lead dogs not under close control cause endless problems. Over the last six months farmers have dealt with MORE THAN A DOZEN cases of sheep worrying. Some sheep were killed, and others had to be euthanised.

IT IS A LEGAL REQUIREMENT TO KEEP ALL DOGS ON A SHORT LEAD OF NO MORE THAN TWO METRES BETWEEN 1st March and 31st July to protect ground nesting birds and livestock with young. DOGS ARE ALSO REQUIRED TO BE ON A LEAD AT ALL TIMES NEAR LIVESTOCK. This applies to all access land i.e. the moorland at all times.





Illegal off-road vehicles cause irreparable damage to the landscape, erosion to the grazing which pushes the livestock further afield, they cause disruption when the farmer is going about his working day and recently off-road bikers threatened to stab a farmer who was on the moor with his school-age daughters attending to his sheep.

Fences are regularly damaged - over a period of eighteen months a local farmer has repaired his fence thirty-two times.

Upland farmers work extremely hard in all weathers proudly producing environmentally friendly grass-fed beef and lamb in the harshest of environments that will not sustain any other form of food production. Their grazing animals contribute to maintaining the beautiful landscapes for legitimate users to enjoy.

While the general public seek to remind farmers of their legal obligations related to the welfare of their livestock it is only right that they are aware of their own when enjoying the vast open moorland that is managed by farmers who have been custodians of this landscape for generations.



The Council also employs a **Parish Lengthsman**, Derrick Jones, for general repairs and maintenance, including attending to Public Rights of Way, mending footpaths, fences and stiles and undertaking a multitude of jobs in and around the town. The Council also employ a full-time **Town Caretaker** position which is funded in part by Rossendale Borough Council. Glen lliff, our Town Caretaker, litter-picks targeted sites the length and breadth of the town, and reports issues and problems to the Clerk. All three maintain healthy attendance sheets – a testament to their professionalism and commitment to the town.

The Town Council's **website**, www.whitworth.gov. uk, is well used and an asset to the Council. The site aims to be a one-stop-shop for Whitworth information for residents and visitors and is updated by the Town Clerk. The Town Council also makes good use of social media; its Facebook page is regularly contributed to.

Whitworth in Bloom managed to continue to put on a blooming fantastic display. They added to the Beasties BnB and planted blackcurrant bushes on Cowm Park Way North. They have continued to tidy up the Garden of Remembrance at Whitworth Cemetery and have planted apple and fruit trees at the community orchard at



Britannia. They have also planted apple trees at Healey Corner covering both ends of our beautiful town.

The Town Council-produced quarterly **Whitworth Valley News** magazine continues to be a very popular read, receiving editorial contributions from a wide variety of organisations and featuring 31 paying advertisers. It involves a significant amount of work for the Clerk but is very well received and ensures all in Whitworth are up to date with town news and developments. It is hand-delivered to all households by the Sports Council volunteers.

The Town Council contributes towards the fight against crime with the continued sponsorship of the **Whitworth community police car**, which has proved invaluable to the local constabulary. This has been made possible by generous sponsorship towards the cost provided by **RRG Toyota Rochdale**.

The Town Council works in partnership with Rossendale and Lancashire Councils and other local organisations including Lancashire Police and Together Housing to provide the best possible services for the Whitworth community. To give examples, the Town Council facilitates monthly Multi-Agency meetings, where representatives of all the main agencies come together to tackle issues in the town. The Town Council continues to take a pro-active approach to tackling the issue of litter and uncollected dog-mess, supporting the legislative work undertaken by the Borough Council, issuing further letters to residents around particular 'grot-spot' areas and supporting volunteers by providing litter picking equipment.

The Town Council's **Tourism and Leisure Committee**, featuring councillor and non-

councillor members, organises or part-organises many events annually – this past year's offers include the Rushcart, Santa Express, New Year's Duck Race and a celebration of the Kings Coronation in partnership with The Ashcroft. Additionally, the Town Council itself is responsible for organising Whitworth's Remembrance Sunday commemorations and the Community Carol Service. All these events serve to preserve and strengthen the town's identity and provide a solid sense of community and civic pride.

Comprising town councillors and representatives of local sporting organisations, the **Whitworth Sports Council** continues to flourish, and plans for the 2023 annual Skyline walk were well underway at time of printing.

TOWN TWINNING

Whitworth has been twinned with Kandel for over 54 years and the friendship between the towns continues. Cllr Aldred and the rest of the committee are instrumental in keeping the twinning alive, and thanks are due to them for

their continued work; if you wish to get involved with Town Twinning in Whitworth please contact them. A delegation from Kandel will be arriving in late June and Whitworth Town Council hope that they all enjoy their visit here.

PLANNING

As a statutory planning consultee, the Town Council passes comments on all Whitworth applications; Rossendale Borough Council then takes these observations into account when reaching planning decisions. Since April 2022, 27 applications have been considered by the

Town Council, ranging from home extensions to tree preservation orders. The Town Council is also consulted on Highways proposals and other consultations which relate to or affect the Whitworth area.

CONCLUSION

Whitworth Town Council continues to work to the best of its ability to serve its community. The quality of the council is monitored and ratified through the benchmark council awards scheme, and the feedback from the community is overwhelmingly positive.

The Town Council strives to be as accessible as possible, with the magazine and website facilitating communications to the community, and social media and the availability of the town clerk and councillors, along with the publicly attended council meetings, enabling a two-way communication with residents, organisations and businesses.





CARING FOR THE COUNTRYSIDE - WHITWORTH TOWN COUNCIL



Sadly, this is a message we must reiterate every year. We are well into the season of lambing, calving and foaling and those of us who roam the local moors will be well aware of the season we are in and perhaps the issues that have concerned local graziers and farmers for many years, namely the worrying of sheep.

The CRoW Act 2000 states that ALL DOG WALKERS must keep their dogs on a short lead of 2 meters between the 1st March and 31st of July and at ALL TIMES in the vicinity of livestock throughout the year. To protect livestock and

ground nesting birds, lapwing, curlew, merlin and snipe. Graziers have the RIGHT in LAW to close the high ground entirely.

Every year there are an alarming number of very sad and preventable incidents involving ewes and lambs, caused by dogs off their leads, worrying the sheep. Sheep worrying causes immense distress to these defenceless animals which are often left in a dreadful, bloody state which results in the humane destruction of the pregnant ewes. Besides the egregious act of sheep worrying, graziers are having to deal with the separation of ewes from their lambs, caused by dogs off their lead and running wildly on the moors in the vicinity of them. This is incredibly distressing and damaging to both animals. Let us not forget that this impacts our commoners and farmers livelihoods too. The common land is managed land and their place of work.

There has never been so much disturbance of livestock, maiming and killing of animals and it is all preventable, by simply ensuring that dog ownership is always responsible where livestock are grazing and complying fully with the CRoW Act 2000.

Please, always be a responsible dog owner and keep your dog on a lead at ALL times around livestock. Thank you.

SAVING THE PUBLIC PATH NETWORK – MESSAGE FROM LCC PUBLIC RIGHTS OF WAY MANAGER DAVID GOODE

In 2000 the Government introduced a cut-off date for adding paths to the Definitive Map (the legal record of public rights of way).

In Wales the cut-off has been scrapped but it is expected to take effect in England in 2031. Ancient ways which have fallen out of use can no longer be recorded on the evidence of pre-



1949 maps and documents. However, short cuts and ginnels now come into public use can be added if the later evidence exists. Regulations yet to be published will tell us what happens to paths which existed before 1949 and are still in use today.

Any ways recorded on the County Council's list of maintainable streets, Definitive Map Modification Orders not yet confirmed, duly-made applications and certain anomalies will probably be exempted from being extinguished by the cut-off but we cannot be certain until we have the Regulations.

However, the message is simple; if you know a public path which is not currently on the Definitive Map, please ask LCC. Then gather some evidence of the public rights and make an application ASAP. You don't need to prove it conclusively, just provide some evidence although obviously the more evidence you have, the better.

WHITWORTH POOL OPEN TO ALL



It is six months since swimmers were able to get back into Whitworth Pool after leaks were repaired.

Last June, Rossendale Leisure Trust discovered there was a serious problem when a bill for £57,000 for water was received from United Utilities.

The pool was immediately closed and investigations began to determine the leak, or leaks, but initially there was no evidence either inside or outside the premises where the water was escaping.

Facilities Manager Mark Kay said: "A lot of people don't realise just how much water there is in a swimming pool - there is around 75,000 gallons. If the water drops by 1cm, that is 500 gallons of water.

"The pool is a significant size of water so there is always some wastage through evaporation but not as much as what we had."

Leisure Trust staff were kept on to keep the gym open and while the pool was out of use, the trust refurbished the interior and resurfaced the side of the pool.

Mark said: "We really appreciate the support and interest people have shown in the pool and we know how much it means to them. The main thing is that it is back open and we have isolated and repaired the problem."






