WAINGAP WOODS

Whitworth Town Council are pleased to announce the appointment of two local contractors who are going to work at Waingap Woods. They will commence work at the site as soon as the weather permits. The perimeter fence at Waingap woods is going to be replaced with new stock fencing. The approximate size of the area is 300 metres so it is a large undertaking. We are also replacing the gates at the car park entrance site with new and improved galvanized steel gates which will be stock proof. There is also a galvanized steel, stock proof gate being fitted on the opposite side of the perimeter fence to fully secure the site. This should ensure the area stays safe and immovable for many years to come.

We are also working to enhance and make safe the footpath and play equipment at what is colloquially known as the Trim Trail at Waingap Woods. We will achieve this by replacing the warped, decked footpath with a new and improved rot proof subframe and walkway. We are going to address the flooding which occurs under the two pieces of play equipment with appropriate drainage, making them accessible all year round.

We would like to thank the people of Whitworth for their patience, and we hope that these much needed improvements will be welcomed by everyone.

THE WORLD FAMOUS WHITWORTH DUCK RACE 2023

As ever the TLC like to kick off the beginning of the year with our New Year's Day Duck Race which is still growing as an event. This year we released nearly 2500 yellow ducks down the overflow from Cowm Reservoir, raising money to fund all the events we run in Whitworth every year. This year, as with previous years, lots of the public took time to watch the race and buy ducks on the day. Due to the heavy rain over Christmas, there was a lot more water in the reservoir which meant that the race was over very quickly. Much to the amusement of the crowds, one of our team nearly lost a welly and ended up with a very wet sock while looking for the last duck who was sheltering at the side of the river. All ducks were safely recaptured and are currently in training for 2024.

This year instead of running the Family Fun Day in July, we are working with the Ashcroft and Rossendale Leisure Trust to host a music event in the carpark at the Ashcroft to celebrate the coronation of King Charles III. How to become a councillor



There are many reasons why you may decide to become a councillor:

- To make a difference to your community
- To represent the views of local people
- To pursue political beliefs

How do I qualify?

There are three basic qualifications to stand for election, which are, that on the day of nomination, you must be:

- 18 years of age or over
- A British citizen, an eligible Commonwealth citizen or a citizen of any member state of the European Union
- Registered to vote in your local area or have lived or worked there for at least 12 months prior to election

You will need to obtain a nomination pack from the Elections Office and be proposed and seconded by electors of the ward in which you are standing for election.

When completing your nomination, please note:

 The people supporting your nomination must not have signed a nomination for any other candidate.

Every English town or parish must hold an Annual Meeting of the Parish for electors registered in the area. This year, Whitworth's Annual Meeting of the Parish takes place on Thursday 11th May at 7:30pm, at The Ashcroft.

The meeting will be quorate (legal) if just two electors are present. Although chaired by the Mayor, this is not a council meeting. It is a meeting for all Whitworth people to get an overview of what is currently happening in the town, looking at the work of various organisations serving Whitworth, and offering electors the opportunity to raise queries and make observations. It is usually over within the hour or so, so why not come along, everyone is welcome. See you there!

WHITWORTH TOWN COUNCIL PRECEPT 2023/2024

Whitworth Town Council has this year set a net budget of £60,384. The Council has worked hard to keep the increase in precept to a minimum, which has been difficult in the current financial climate.

This past year has seen some pressures on finances and significant increases in costs, but some decent savings have been made in various areas of the budget to off-set this and the Town Council's wise investments are providing a healthy dividend.

The Council is facing tough times in the next few years due to rising costs in the current economic climate, so we strive to increase income and reduce spending wherever possible. Expenditure includes salaries for the Town Clerk (30 hours), our full-time Whitworth Town Caretaker, who makes a significant impact on the town's cleanliness, and our Parish Lengthsman, who tackles repairs and general maintenance around the town and opening of the toilets at weekends.

The Town Council utilises social media and their website to encourage a two-way dialogue with the community. The Valley News magazine, produced quarterly, continues to be hugely popular, and the Council's Tourism and Leisure Committee has a variety of leisure and cultural events planned for the year ahead. The Town Council continues to promote Whitworth as a great place to live, and lobbies hard for the best possible services for the town. It is at the forefront of tackling crime through the sponsorship of the Police Community Support Vehicle and facilitates monthly multi-agency meetings attended by all the local agencies.

To conclude, the Town Council continues to be proud of its achievements and looks forward to working with and for the people of Whitworth during the forthcoming financial year.



FOCUS ON LOCAL BUSINESS

Whitworth has a wealth of talent, industry and social enterprise. Our intention is to put the spotlight on some familiar names and organisations, and some not so familiar – to give us all an insight as to what these great individuals and organisations bring to the community.

Our first interview is with the founder and owner Samantha Clarke, who runs Samba Dance and Fitness here in Whitworth.

Q: Tell us about yourself please Samantha?

A: I started dancing when I was 2, doing Ballet, Tap and Morris dancing. I progressed into Latin and Ballroom, then into Freestyle. I then began competing at the age of 11 in Freestyle. Years later I became a cheer teacher and started my fitness instructor degree. Prior to starting my degree, I attended Performing Arts college. I also moved to the USA and became an au pair for 18 months.

I always wanted my own school. In the performing arts/stage world I would have had to meet a minimum height criteria of 5'4, but am only 5ft so that couldn't happen.

When I came back to the UK I taught at Whitworth Civic Hall for Jean Cowsill for a while, got married, had my son. I was then a private nanny and took my son with me – it was at this point that I decided to give it a go on my own (teaching).

In January 1999 I started classes on a Weds evening at the old Whitworth Reform Club (which is now flats). Was there for 20 months, then had to move to premises on Tong Lane for 6-7 years. After this I moved to Station Road where Valley Thai boxing is now. Finally, I bought these premises on Market Street in March 2018.

Parents that I taught back then at the start now bring their children to the group and I teach them too!

Q: Can you share with us how many members you have and the areas that they come from? (Ie – Shawforth, Rochdale, Healey, Whitworth, Bacup etc)

A: We have people from Norden, Helmshore, Haslingden, Reed, Littleborough, but with the majority from Whitworth (70%). Around 200 students in all – ages 20 months upwards.



Q: What is your proudest moment so far?

A: Buying this building and knowing that this is what I've always strived for, opening those gates and it finally sinking in that it has become a reality.

Q: Tell me about your team:

A: I'm proud of my Staff who are extremely loyal and talented. I couldn't do it without them. Josie, Sally, Abbie and Freya are our amazing dance teachers. We also have Gemma our excellent drama teacher and Leah is our dedicated singing teacher.

Q: What are the plans for next year?

A: Much of the same, a big festival in Skegness mid-October. A show at the Ashcroft at the end of June. Big Christmas Presentation at the Ashcroft and various Freestyle comps that we will be doing from Jan onwards.



Q: What styles do you teach?

A: Ballet, Tap, Latin and Ballroom dancing, Street, Breakdancing, Freestyle (disco) and Cheerleading. We also teach drama, singing and we now have Acro lessons (stamina, flexibility and acrobatics). Fitness classes – bums and tums, bootcamp, BounceFit and circuit training.

Q: Are there many boys taking part? Back in the day there was a massive interest in street dancing.

A: Quite a few yes – but they do all styles not just Street and Breakdancing

Q: Do we have any future Olympic contenders on our hands?

A: We have had a few go onto stage school, dancing on cruise ships, but they all start here. This is the 1st step for people to learn and decide if it's a career choice or hobby.

Q: What does the group mean to you?

A: This is my family, I have a son but I class all of my students as one big family.

Q: Any advice for people curious about joining?

A: Just come and see us, give it a try. Not every class might be for you, but there could be something you like. There are no tie-ins and we are very accessible. In June the Sports Council used to run a Sports Festival, where I offered free taster classes for a week. There wasn't much take up – I hope that the next time it comes around we see more visitors to see what we are about.

We're not just here for dance, we are a local facilitator for fun, fitness, singing and drama.





WHITWORTH MUSEUM

By the time this magazine is issued, it is likely that the factory chimney attached to the museum building and one of the few remaining in the Valley, will have been reduced in height. Already abbreviated from its original height, the chimney's condition was such that serious corrective surgery was urgently required in order to stabilise the structure for the long term.



When constructed in c.1850, the chimney was part of a system which served the steam generation needs of Bridge Mills Number Four and Number Five, two of five spinning and weaving mills constructed and operated by Ralph Rawstron. Unusually, the Lancashire boilers were located on the opposite side of North Street to the chimney and were linked by an underground flue. It is possible part of the flue system remains.

As was customary at the time, Rawstron constructed houses in the immediate vicinity of his mills to accommodate his workforce; hence we have South Street, and had back-to-back dwellings in Middle Street and North Street, the latter leading into Rawstron and Lloyd Streets.

Following a period of closure for safe working, the museum will re-open to the public from 11.00am – 4.00pm on Saturday, 18th February 2023.
