## **REMEMBRANCE DAY 2020** The Tragic story behind two of Whitworth's fallen



For almost 100 years, Remembrance Sunday in Whitworth has been a significant date in the Township's diary and it has been with justifiable pride that many have joined the parade along Market Street. Marching to the Festival Park with shoulders back and a strong step, the parade, accompanied by the steady beat of the Whitworth Vale & Healey Band, brings a unique and moving dignity to the occasion. It is humbling to see the crowd, at times as many as 500 or more, gathered around Whitworth's memorial, paying tribute. Engraved on the memorial's four tablets are some 150 names of the fallen. Some died over a 100 years ago, others, those soldiers, sailors and airmen of WWII, at least 75 years ago. The reality however is that most who gather have no recollection or knowledge of those young and healthy Whitworth men who answered the call of duty and who, often in high spirits, marched away from their homes and families, never to return.

This year, circumstances have been far from normal. Understandable restrictions brought about by the Covid-19 virus mean that a parade has not been possible and wreath laying became a private matter for those organisations and individuals still wishing to place their token of respect at the foot of the memorial.

Whilst Remembrance Day is rightly dedicated to the memory of the fallen, we should not forget those, including civilians, who, as a result of war, had to live out the rest of their lives suffering in ways which are difficult to imagine. Some bore physical disfigurement or injury so severe that their lives were changed forever. Others, whilst exhibiting no outward signs of injury, were destined to endure a mental anguish which today we refer to as Post Traumatic Stress Disorder. For many, indeed for most, this condition remained, until comparatively recently, unrecognised, untreated and little understood.

Of course, behind each name on the memorial is a tragic story. Some families were able to bravely cope with the loss; others totally destroyed by its consequences. Whilst it would be wrong to imply that one family's loss was greater than that of another, we can perhaps take a look at the story of one family which sits behind two of the names on the 1939 -1945 tablet.

Brothers Oliver and Raymond Lambert were the sons of the railway crossing keeper at Tong Lane, Oliver Lambert and his wife Dora. Through the 1920's and into the 1930's, the boys lived with their parents at the keeper's cottage adjacent to the crossing itself. With the coming of war, both joined the RAF and both became air gunners, a position often referred to in RAF vernacular as a 'tail-end Charlie' when applied to the rear gun turret of a bomber.

In March 1943 Raymond, the younger of the brothers, was serving with 199 Squadron based at RAF Ingham in Lincolnshire, the squadron at that time operating the twin engine Vickers Wellington medium bomber. On the evening of 12th March 1943, 13 aircraft of 199 Squadron, along with 440 other British and allied aircraft, were detailed to join a major bombing raid on the German industrial city of Essen, the focus and main target of the attack being the massive Krupp armaments factory.

At 1930hrs a fully loaded Wellington, under the command of Sgt. Dennis Clifford, took-off from RAF Ingham with, amongst its crew of five, Sgt. Raymond Lambert sitting in his cramped rear gun turret. Leaving behind the flat, endless fields of Lincolnshire, the aircraft passed over the coast in the vicinity

of Mablethorpe before heading out across the North Sea with an intended landfall near Zandfoort in The Netherlands. Sadly, after leaving the coast of Britain, nothing further was ever seen or heard of the aircraft or its crew. It seems likely that the Wellington, at some point before making its landfall, was shot-down by one of the ever present German night-fighters patrolling that area of the North Sea. If this was the case, the crew and wreckage would have been lost to the sea. We may never know but, recent evidence has come to light to suggest this theory may be correct. All five crew members are remembered on the RAF Memorial at Runnymede. Sgt Raymond Lambert was 19 years old when he died and was engaged to be married to a local Whitworth girl.

It must have been devastating for Mr & Mrs Lambert and Raymond's fiancé when news reached Whitworth that Raymond was "missing". It may however have been many weeks or even months before he was officially presumed dead. Bad though this was, more equally devastating news was to follow.

The Lambert's eldest son, Oliver, now married with his young wife, Mary Elizabeth, expecting their first child, had been posted to 97 Squadron, one of the RAF's elite Pathfinder Force squadrons. These squadrons were tasked with marking targets using coloured flares in order to focus the bombing effort of the main force which, when bombing the large German cities, could consist of anything up to 1000 aircraft. In August 1943, Oliver's squadron was operating out of RAF Bourn in Cambridgeshire and Warrant Officer Lambert was assigned as air-gunner in the Flight Commander's Avro Lancaster, JA916L.

On the evening of 31st August 1943, Lancaster JA916L was detailed to 'mark' a raid on Berlin, the German capital. Under the captaincy of W/ Cdr Burns, JA916L approached the bomb zone at around 2355hrs and, at an altitude of about 19,000ft, dropped its four Target Indicator flares. Almost immediately the aircraft was attacked head-on by a German Focke Wolf 190 resulting in the Lancaster sustaining terminal damage. W/Cdr Burns had little alternative but to order his crew to 'bale out'. Believing the other six members of the crew had escaped by parachute, Burns, still

at the controls, aimed the burning Lancaster at the focus point of the target. After dropping rapidly to 18,000ft the aircraft, still carrying a 7000lb high capacity bomb load, exploded in mid air, catapulting Burns out through the cockpit canopy. Although seriously injured he was to survive. Unknown to W/ Cdr Burns, WO Lambert, possibly entombed in a jammed gun turret, had not been able to bale out when ordered to do so and went down with what remained of the aircraft. Oliver Lambert's body was recovered from the wreckage and interred in a temporary cemetery nearby. In 1946 the remains of WO Oliver Lambert DFM were re-interred at the Berlin 1939 – 1945 War Cemetery. Oliver was just 22 years of age when he died but already held the Distinguished Flying Medal\* and was a veteran of 74 sorties. His heart-broken wife Mary Elizabeth Lambert was to give birth to Joy, the couple's only child, in January 1944. Oliver was never to see his wife again or enjoy the delights of their baby daughter. Joy would never meet her father.

As a result of war, the Lambert family would see two sons lost, a marriage denied, the loss of a husband and a daughter who would never see her father. The sacrifice of this brave family was immense.

This is just about one family but a tragic story lies behind every name on Whitworth's memorial. With or without a Remembrance Day parade, they all justly deserve our enduring respect.



The volunteers will try to stick to the timings and route as much as possible but this could vary depending on traffic and weather conditions.

The idea is that people watch and wave from their doorsteps, where this is not possible people can watch and wave from the pavement as long as households are not gathering and current lockdown restrictions allow this. If crowds are forming or people are not adhering to the guidelines then the event will be stopped. The Santa Express' will drive slowly around the route but will not be stopping.



## LOCAL COMMUNITY GROUPS SHARE £40K WINDFALL

2020 saw 13 local projects sharing a £40,000 windfall awarded through the Crook Hill Community Fund. The latest awards take the total amount distributed since the Fund launched in 2016 to over £180,000.

Scooping £6,300 to improve Whittles Park in Littleborough was Littleborough Boxing Club (LBC). Mark Oldham, Charity Director at LBC commented: "This Grant is massive not just for the club but for the surrounding area. This opens up a 3.5 acre space for kids to play football and rounders, for local schools to use and the boxing and running club will also use the site. It's going to convert a struggling ground into one which provides endless opportunity."

Also celebrating their £2,750 grant award was Rochdale Walton Angling Society (RWAS). Barry Watkins, Treasurer, RWAS commented: "This award providing three new fishing pegs will be a great asset to our Society and help to promote our aim of social and family angling in our area as well as assisting our less able members. At the same time we will be using 100% recycled materials (made from plastic milk bottles) otherwise destined for landfill for the actual pegs which will also be anti-slip, safe and maintenance free."

The other projects being supported this year are Ebor Studio, The Star Tree Studio CIC, Whitworth Vale & Healey Band, Littleborough Civic Trust, Wardle Volunteers, Littleborough Food & Drink Festival, Whitworth in Bloom, Whitworth Sports Council, 17th Rochdale 1st Wardle Scouts, Keep Whitworth Tidy and Wardle Academy Band Association.

This year's grant awards were made just as the Covid-19 crisis was unfolding across the world. To react positively to the situation, Crook Hill Wind Farm which provides the money for the Fund has announced changes to next year's eligibility criteria to ensure as many groups as possible can apply for funding. The temporary changes for 2021 are:

- Priority will no longer be given to groups able to provide match funding. This acknowledges the fact that that some groups will struggle to provide match funding at present due to the impact of Covid-19.
- Re-application restrictions have been lifted. Groups that were awarded a grant in 2020 may re-apply. This acknowledges the fact that groups could have applied this year before Covid-19 really hit and may therefore now have a more urgent need for grant funding that wasn't foreseen when they last applied.

Liz Payne, Grant Director, GrantScape commented: "The Fund criteria changes which are being made in response to the global Covid-19 situation, will help at a local level. More groups will now be able to apply for grant support in 2021 to help them adapt should the situation continue and recover as the crisis passes."

The funding for the Community Fund is provided by Crook Hill Wind Farm which is managed

by independent investment firm, Vantage Infrastructure (www.vantageinfra.com), with support of Partnerships for Renewables (www.pfr.co.uk). The Fund distributes £35,000 annually over the 20 - 25 year lifetime of the project. Groups located within a 5km radius of the wind farm can apply for grants of between £250 and £10,000. The Fund is being administered by national charity GrantScape.

# COVID RELATED GRANTS AND SUPPORT

## **TEST AND TRACE SUPPORT PAYMENTS**

Test and Trace Support Payments of £500 are to support people on low incomes who are unable to work from home if they are told to self-isolate by NHS Test and Trace and will lose income as a result. The scheme will last until 31 January 2021. Eligibility is restricted to people who:

- Have been told to stay at home and self-isolate by NHS Test and Trace, either because they
  have tested positive for coronavirus or have recently been in close contact with someone
  who has tested positive;
- Are employed or self-employed;
- Are unable to work from home and will lose income as a result; and
- Are currently receiving Universal Credit, Working Tax Credit, income-based Employment and Support Allowance, income-based Jobseeker's Allowance, Income Support, Housing Benefit and/or Pension Credit.

If you do not meet the 4 conditions, there are a limited number of £500 discretionary payment to individuals who are on low incomes and will face financial hardship as a result of not being able to work while they are self-isolating. Further information and a link to the application form are available on the Rossendale Borough Council website.

## LOCAL RESTRICTIONS SUPPORT GRANT

Local Restrictions Support Grant supports businesses that were open as usual, but which were then required to close due to local lockdown restrictions imposed by government.

Your business may be eligible if it occupies property on which it pays business rates and is in a local lockdown area and has been required to close because of the formal publication of local restrictions guidance that resulted in a first full day of closure on or after 9 September. This funding is not retrospective. Applications for funding can be made via the Rossendale Borough Council website.

## **EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE GRANT**

Emergency Assistance Grant for Food and Essential Supplies is a one off contribution for local authorities in England to use to support people who are struggling to afford food and other essentials due to COVID-19. In Burnley, Pendle and Rossendale the scheme is being administered by Burnley Pendle & Rossendale Council for Voluntary Service (BPRCVS)..

Applicants must be: at least 18 years of age, a resident in Burnley, Pendle or Rossendale, able to demonstrate that they struggling to afford food or other essentials due to Covid-19, not have any savings, access to other monies or affordable source of funding, or other means of accessing support. A maximum award of £100 for food and £200 for essential items can be offered through this scheme.

### WHITWORTH MUSEUM

Following Covid lockdown in March 2020, Whitworth Museum, along with most other organisations, was forced to close its doors to the public. Following the initial major review and easing of restrictions, museums and galleries were permitted to re-open from 4th July 2020, providing all required risk assessments had been carried out and appropriate measures put in place.

Whitworth Museum waited for the Museum Association to provide practical guidance and following implementation of the necessary measures, re-opened to the public on Saturday, 19th September 2020. Some changes have been necessary however. The usual Tuesday evening opening remains suspended but Saturday opening hours have increased to 11.00am until 4.00pm each week. For those wishing to visit, Track and Trace is in operation and visitors are required to wear a mask whilst inside the building. Volunteers are required to limit numbers to 6 visitors at any one time. The Museum is registered as "OK TO GO" with Visit Britain and with NHS Track & Trace. Obviously, these measures will be reviewed on an ongoing basis and, where necessary, changed accordingly.

## **COVID TEST AND TRACE**

The NHS Test and Trace service plays an important role in the fight against coronavirus and it's vital the public have confidence and trust in the service, however there are concerns about the opportunity for criminals to commit scams.

Contact tracers will only call you from the number 0300 013 5000 or 0300 123 7790. Local contact tracers will contact you from a local council number. If you're unsure if this is genuine, please contact your local council for advice. Anyone who does not wish to talk over the phone can request the NHS Test and Trace service to send an email or text instead, inviting them to log into the web based service. All texts or emails sent by NHS test and trace will ask people to sign into the contact tracing website and will provide you with a unique reference number. We would advise people to type the web address https://contact-tracing.phe.gov.uk directly into their browser followed by the unique reference number given to you rather than clicking on any link provided in the message.

The NHS test and trace service will never:

Ask you to dial a premium rate number to speak to them (for example those starting 09 or 087) Ask you to make any payment or purchase a product of any kind

Ask for any details about your bank account

Ask for your social media identities or login details or those of your contacts

Ask you for any passwords or PINS or ask you to set up any passwords or PINS over the phone

Ask you to download any software to your PC or ask you to hand over control or your PCs smartphone or tablet to anyone else

Ask you to access any website that does not belong to the government or NHS

# JOHN KEOGH WARNS CRIMINALS ARE CURRENTLY ABLE TO ENJOY A PERFECT STORM OF OPPORTUNITY.

The news is full of stories surrounding the global pandemic and people have their eyes firmly fixed on how they can protect themselves against this virus. Whilst we are all focused on preventing the spread, opportunists see an opening to use fear of the virus to elicit information and hard cash from those that would normally be on their guard against such methods.

Scammers use multiple methods to cajole vulnerable people into making rash decisions to further their immoral activity. It may be something seemingly innocuous, offering a shopping service and disappearing with the money, or could be something more sophisticated involving the sale of fake Covid-19 cures, tests or PPE or preying on those that may be suffering financial hardship by offering get rich quick schemes or loans. The type of con is only limited by the imagination of the criminal, but they are likely to use methods designed to prey on the fear of people and will likely have a time limiting factor too.

## LOCKDOWN AT ANGLO RECYCLING

Anglo's big Lancashire mill meant staff could socially distance and continue to trade through the pandemic. Staff who worked through the pandemic were all volunteers. The company is a poster boy for the furlough scheme with 75% of staff on furlough in April and all staff back at work in August. There have been no compulsory redundancies. The company satisfied every customer order during the period- even if the boss was occasionally seen on a machine (nothing too technical for him though!).

In addition the company took the chance to refurbish some surplus space in part of their 1851 mill for a local entrepreneur who has started a successful gym in the Anglo mill. This meant that the gym could open and offer a full programme of classes and equipment (including a barbers shop) when government restrictions were lifted in July.

As orders were few and far between in the early days, Anglo refurbished the recycling line which had run non stop since 2010. They have always been able to process and recycle back into fibre carpet edges and clothing- but wanted to extend their capability and offer greater efficiency as customers bring a variety of new waste streams. This extended capability will be a great strength to the business going forward.

The walk will only go ahead if the general Coronavirus situation feels ok, government and local council rules permit, landowners are happy to give permissions, the Golf Club are able to accommodate, there are enough volunteers and organisers are confident to keep everyone as safe as can be.

If it happens, it will be Skyline 7, with the route being clockwise, i.e. up Rooley Moor Road, with a Skyline Sunday Stroll of 3 miles and a Western Skyline of 9 miles as well as the full 14-miler. To judge by the number of people on the moors during lockdown it feels like there's a goodly appetite for a grand day's walking...so, fingers crossed, and let's see.
