Whitworth in Bloom, the story so far ...

Whitworth in Bloom is a community based, volunteer led organisation who aim to initiate a movement in Whitworth to improve our sense of civic pride through imaginative planting, encouraging recycling and sustainability projects and eliminate eyesores that blight our streets such as litter, graffiti and vandalism. The idea was to combine the groups that are already working hard to improve our town and work on one project together.

The committee of 7 willing volunteers only formed on 31st March and the achievements which have been made already are amazing. By taking part in the competition they are hoping to increase the feeling of civic pride and start the ball rolling on a long-term plan to improve the local environment.

The North West in Bloom judges visited on 18th July and the committee will have to wait until the end of the year to hear the results. In the mean time, this is what has been achieved for Whitworth in Bloom 2109—first time entry.

The eye-catching planted bike feature was a no brainer as this is also the start of our local cycleway.



What better place to start the judging route than the Northern entrance to our town. Before we got on with blooming the boundary was nothing to write home about but with the help of community volunteers and the 41st Whitworth Scouts planting skills the area has been transformed.

The children plant vegetables which are used in the school kitchen from plums to potatoes. They have even made strawberry jam from the strawberries they have grown!


GALLERY AT THE BATH

WHITWORTH & DISTRICT U3A

The Whitworth & District U3A celebrated its second anniversary in April 2019 with 90 members. Membership of the U3A is £15 per annum and runs from July 2019. There are currently 13 interest groups, the most recent ones being Birdwatching and French for Beginners.

COMMUNITY DEFIBRILLATORS FOR ROSSENDALE

(Receives the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service)

Community Defibrillators for Rossendale, (CDfR) a group of volunteers based in Rossendale, Lancashire, have been honoured with the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service, the highest award a voluntary group can receive in the UK, equivalent to a MBE.

The Queen's Award for Voluntary Service recognises outstanding work by volunteer groups to benefit their local communities and is the equivalent of an MBE. Representatives from CDfR, Brian Pickup and Dawn Taylor, attended a Garden Party at Buckingham Palace in May, along with other recipients of this year's Award, and will receive their award from Lord Shuttleworth, Lord Lieutenant of Lancashire, in July.

One of Community Defibrillators for Rossendale's Founder Members, Chairman Andrew Walmsley, said: "From Dawn Taylor's initial idea in 2010, she remains a driving force behind making public access defibrillators available across the Rossendale Valley. We are honoured and delighted that the work of our everexpanding group has been recognised by Her Majesty the Queen and thank everyone who assists with the project.

The units have been deployed on several occasions, having been registered with North West Ambulance Service, who will advise the access code should it be necessary."



IMPROVING WALLBANK LODGE

The lodge on Wallbank Drive has been suffering from neglect since improvement work was carried out by Rossendale Groundwork in 2005. It was originally used to power a cotton dyeing mill and you can read more about it's history on the information board on site. Local resident, John Young has proposed a new scheme to make the lodge area, including the adjacent burial ground, more attractive for people whilst also promoting its wildlife potential.



Current Plans Include:

Improve the water quality (e.g. by aeration) and therefore wildlife habitat.

Clear the surrounding areas of excess undergrowth to allow better light for existing native trees.

Extend the area of grassland, managed as a wildflower meadow.

Install seating and a picnic area.

Clear encroaching vegetation from the original pathways to enable wheelchair access to a new platform.

Repair the damaged paving by the fishing jetty.

Install bird and bat nesting boxes.

Promote the educational value of the site (wildlife identification etc.) by liaising with local schools. The work is carried out by volunteers, but also with professional help funded by various grants.

1ST TEAM DOUBLE CHAMPIONS

It's been the most successful season in the history of the Whitworth Valley 1st Team, being crowned Lancashire Amateur League Premier Division winners and cup winners. It was Lee Kershaw & Stevie Howarth's 1st season at Valley and it exceeded any expectations they had when they took over. They were welcomed with open arms which is a credit to the club & the area.

The squad of players inherited from Jon Leech and John Leyland had just finished Champions of Division One so they knew they had the winning mentality, but this was Premier Division football. They signed 5/6 quality players in all areas to compete for positions. They also made a few simple changes straight away to appear more professional.

From the start of the season they were playing like potential champions. In their first 4 games they scored 15 goals, conceded none, winning all of them. This firepower and a solid defence set up continued throughout the season. They finished with the best offensive record (94 goals scored) and also the best defensive record (24 goals conceded) for the 26-game season. They also finished 11 points ahead of second place.

The season culminated with their cup final at Leyland. Valley beat last season's champions, Mostonians, 3-1. The support Valley had was exceptional for an Amateur club and Valley hope that this continues to the next. Lee & Ste are hoping for 'more of the same' for the upcoming season UTV

In May, Analogue Farm's first artist-in-residence Karel Doing ran a workshop for 21 people, from complete beginners to experienced filmmakers, including Whitworth residents, students from Middleton College and people from Manchester, London, Nottingham and Newcastle. They learned the hands-on phytogram method, which harnesses the internal chemistry of plants to create spectacular images on 16mm film and paper. Watch the film they made www.analoguefarm.com

The internationally renowned Canadian artist filmmaking collective Film Farm visited Analogue Farm to screen films alongside works by Karel Doing. Each year since 1994, Film Farm has selected 12 artists, some novices – some highly experienced, to take part in an intensive filmmaking workshop learning how to shoot, hand-process, tint/tone and edit 16mm film. Film Farm presented handmade 16mm films and videos from their 25 year history in an 18th century barn, which was transformed into a cinema with straw bales for seats.

In June, Analogue Farm & Mid-Pennine Arts presented The Queen of the Well, a show based on a legend about a water spirit who lives in the Old Lady Churn Well on Brown Wardle Hill. Local artist Amy Callaghan helped David Chatton Barker magically transform rubbish found on the local moors into spellbinding puppets. Children and adults alike came to the performance, which was accompanied by live musicians, including members of Whitworth & Healey Vale Brass Band with Alison Cooper (a.ka. Magpahi), who grew up in the valley.

FORTHCOMING - On Wednesday 28th August from 7.30pm there will be a film screening by Cinecaravan, a travelling cinema that presents screenings across Europe. Cinecaravan is a non-profit initiative that concentrates on showing short creative documentary films with the filmmakers there to present their work. On the day of the rushcart procession Sunday 1st September, our new community space The Bug on Market Street opens to host activities connecting the arts, heritage and the environment. LOCAL COMMUNITY GROUP SHARE £43K WINDFALL

Fifteen groups have been selected to receive grants through the Crook Hill Community Fund. The latest projects join a list of over 50 schemes which have received support since 2016. This year's grant awards ranged from £899 awarded to Whitworth Amateur Musical and Dramatic Society for a new sound desk, up to £6,120 awarded to The Friends of Whitworth Youth (FWY) for their project 'Dads, Me and Tea'. Sarah Corke, FWY Project Leader commented: "We are very grateful to the Crook Hill Fund for funding us to expand our Dad's, Me and Tea project, we are looking forward to more provision for Dad's and their children to spend quality time together!"



Walsden Cricket and Bowling Club were also amongst those celebrating a grant of £5K to go towards their objective to make the club fully wheelchair accessible and Littleborough Brass Band were delighted to receive £2,000 through the Fund. Other projects being supported include The Friends of St Peter's Church in Walsden, Whitworth Town Council, Littleborough Arts Festival, Whitworth Historical Society, Wardle Football Club, Calderdale Wellbeing, Rochdale (Whitworth) 41st Scout Group, Friends of Hare Hill Park, Disability Support Calderdale and Pennines in Bloom.

The funding for the Community Fund is provided by Crook Hill Wind Farm and distributes £35,000 annually over the 20 - 25 year lifetime of the project. Groups located within a 5km radius of the wind farm can apply for grants of between £250 and £10,000. The Fund is being administered by national charity GrantScape and a full list of groups supported through the Fund and more details can be found on their website www.grantscape.org.uk/fund/crook-hill-community-benefit-fund

The next application deadline is 12 February 2020.

HAVE YOUR SAY ON THE ROADS

You can have your say on your roads and transport locally by completing a short survey. As part of a new campaign to promote the work of their highways service, Lancashire County Council is encouraging people to complete the National Highways and Transport (NHT) survey, which measures public satisfaction with services across different local authorities.

The campaign will also focus on their work fixing around 40,000 potholes a year, and ask people to report potholes on their website. This year, the council will spend £24m to maintain Lancashire's 4,600 miles of highways and 5,300 miles of footways. Continued investment has improved the condition of the county's roads, and helped to reduce the number of potholes by 38% in the last two years.
